1326 CARS OF PEARS SENT EAST

Medford, Nov. 21.—During the past shipping season just ended here, 1326 cars of pears were sent from Medford to the eastern market as against 600 cars shipped east last year. Apple shipping from the valley will continue for several weeks yet until the entire 195 cars have been shipped. Only 70 cars have already gone. Last season's apple shipment amounted to 670 cars.
