STANFORD IS READY FOR PITT ON DEC. 30

Stanford University, Dec. 21—December 30 the Pittsburgh Panther will stalk into the Stanford stadium to do battle with the Stanford Indian in the first of two great east-west games that will ring down the curtain on a long and brilliant Pacific coast football season.
The interesting feature of this game is that both teams have shown a wonderful change in game development, both starting the season with defeats, and both showing remarkable improvement each week until, at the end of the regular season, both were formidable machines capable of showing well against any teams in the country.
Pitt ended its eastern season with an impressive victory over Penn State, which will play in Pasadena on New Year's day. Stanford played its last conference game, holding the great California Bears in the second half to only one touchdown, two unfavorable breaks, plus an inability to cope with the California passing game being the reason for California's winning margin.
Glenn Warner, Pitt coach, will bring with him one of the best back fields in the country with Holleran, Flanagan, Anderson and Hewitt. Captain Tommy Holleran is the strategist, Flanagan and Anderson are fast, shifty halves. While Hewitt, weighing 230 pounds, has all the drive and spirit of California's famous "Babe" Morrison.
The Stanford backfield is hardly comparable to the Pitt quartet but it is consistently good. The Cardinal line, however, should be slightly superior to the Panthers' forwards. It has a weight advantage and charges low and hard.
The Warner machine is one with a great deal of brute strength, the final punch centering in Hewitt, who is called into action to make the necessary distance on fourth down.
With Coach Kerr improving the Stanford offense against passes the Cards should be able to hold the Panthers fairly even. Breaks may have much to do with the result. Stanford has had the advantage of almost none this year, but the whole team will be watching Hewitt whose one bad habit is a tendency to fumble. If he drops the ball next Saturday, Stanford is going to have eleven men there to recover.

Auburn Mayor Guilty of Attack On Sheriff

Seattle, Dec. 21.—Convicted of malicious prosecution, as an aftermath of the recent election, J. E. West, former mayor of Auburn, was preparing to seek a new trial today. If the verdict returned by a superior court jury late yesterday is sustained, West will face a prison sentence of from six months to five years. The case grew out of the arrest of Sheriff Matt Starwick just before the late election West having sworn before two warrants charging Starwick with illegal registration. Starwick was immediately acquitted when he went before a justice court at Renton and he immediately started action against West.
New York—Dec. 21.—Vincent Astor, George F. Baker, Marshall Field, John D. Ryan, Harry Payne Whitney, J. P. Morgan and other leaders of the New York financial set, have formed a syndicate and will build a million dollar golf club near Locust Valley, L. I. The owners will be built for their game, it was said.

TURKEY MARKET WEAK

Portland, Dec. 21.—The dressed turkey market did not look good yesterday. The supply was out of all proportion to the demand and the market consequently became very weak.

Receipts were much heavier than on Tuesday and while more buyers were on hand, they were not numerous enough to make much impression on the supply. Seeing the condition of the market the larger retailers held back and this added to the weakness.

Jobbers started off at 30¢ per lb. cents, but in the afternoon they found it necessary to cut their selling prices. Choice turkeys were then offered freely to the trade at 35 cents, but buyers either bid 34 cents or held off entirely. The prospects for today's market are not bright.

There were also large receipts of live poultry of all kinds, and while former prices were quoted there was but little business done. Before the holiday rush here could have been sold easily, but shippers then kept them back.

EGG PRICES CONTINUE TO FALL

Portland, Dec. 21.—Egg prices had another fall yesterday and the indications are the market will decline steadily from now on. The association cut prices 30 cents for current receipts and 40 cents for firm, while on the street candied ranch could be bought freely at 40¢ per doz. and selected at 40¢ per doz. Pullets were generally offered at 40¢.

Buying prices were also reduced, bids being 30 cents for current receipts and 40 cents for firm. Another decline is expected Saturday.

The butter market was firm with a demand for all the cubes available.

WHEAT VALUES MAINTAINED

Portland, Dec. 21.—The wheat market continued steady in spite of the quietness. There was little buying by the mills and exporters took only an occasional lot, lower and there. For club, \$1.25 was obtainable. There was a tendency for soft white at \$1.27. Red wheat was dull. A small lot of Big Bend wheat was sold on the sound at \$1.07. Montana wheat now finds a better market. At the Merchant's Exchange all wheat bids were unchanged except soft white, northern spring and western red, which were 1¢ lower.

TURKEY WAR ON

Colusa, Cal., Dec. 21.—(United Press.)—Following the disastrous break in turkey prices the morning before Thanksgiving, and because San Francisco commission merchants have predicted that Christmas turkeys will not bring the growers more than 30 cents a pound, there are being taken here to form a Northern California Turkey Growers' association which shall guarantee a fair price to the producer in the future.

The association will include turkey growers in Yolo, Sutter, Yuba, Butte, Colusa, Glenn and Placer counties. Later it may take in all the northern counties.

The proposed association, which will employ all of the approved methods of co-operative marketing, will meet at Marysville early in January. The prospective members of the association have stated that their one aim is to stabilize the prices of next year's turkey crop.

There is much dissatisfaction here with the way the commission men have been handling the market situation. They charge that the morning before Thanksgiving they arbitrarily without regard to the available supply or the demand, telling the producer what they must get and the consumers what they must pay, both producer and consumer suffering thereby.

Hereafter, it is hoped, the growers themselves will be able to get and demand a fair price on their birds based on a reasonable cost of production, and that the new association will be able to enforce the price.

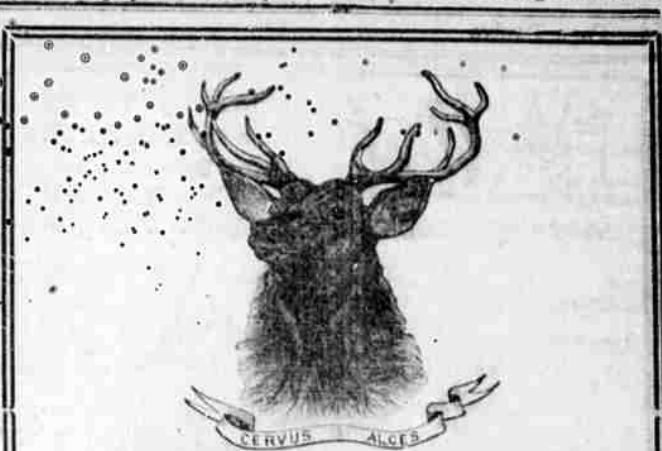
