HIGH WATER BRINGS MANY LOGS TO MILLS

The recent high water in the Siuslaw, Coquille and Umpqua rivers has brought down millions of feet of logs to the mills near the river mouths, and has been a great boon to the sawmills, according to coast people who are visitors to the city. Many mills which have been handicapped because of shortage of logs are now well supplied and are greatly increasing their output.

There is estimated to be between three and four million feet of logs on the Siuslaw, Umpqua and Coquille rivers which are ready for the next freshet. Business is turning toward the coast section because of the open water and easy logging as compared with the log-gate operations which are being hindered by snow in the Cascade range.

Most of the mills on the coast are preparing to shut down only during the week between Christmas and New Years. During this time the machinery will be overhauled so a maximum output can be realized on resuming operations. It is reported.

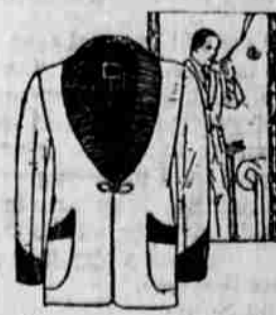
