Boxing Body Again Prohibits Fighters

New York, Dec. 21--Summary warning not to try to do business with Johnny Kilbane, Johnny Wilson or Jess Willard was served on promoters by the New York boxing commission.

The men in question have such self-assessed valuations that New York is their only field and the bars raised against them here keep them idle. William Muldoon says as long as he is head of the commission, the two Johns are powers and Jess is too old.

The chairman of the commission was accused by the report that Jess Willard had matched Kilbane and Eugene Curran the European featherweight champion to meet for the world's title next summer at the Polo grounds.

The same kind of reports had it that O'Rourke, formerly a deputy on the commission had signed Willard and Dempsey for another big card at 16-
