CORVALLIS MAKES READY FOR TOLEDO

Corvallis, Dec. 21.—Corvallis school officials regard the Medford protest against the football game here with Toledo as unfair and unsportsmanlike and are going ahead with the program. Principal McMaster telegraphed the Toledo team to that effect yesterday afternoon, receiving the following message today: "Thanks for game assurance. Tickets purchased; Pullman ordered. We will leave Christmas day and arrive in Portland Saturday morning."

Corvallis business men's committee in charge of the arrangements today deposited \$5,000 in the bank to underwrite the game. Plans are being made to meet the Toledo team in Portland and put on a parade in Corvallis automobiles accompanied by the high school band. It is hoped to get Portland's cooperation to give the easterners a regular western welcome.

According to Mr. McMaster, at the time of the meeting of the state athletic board in control of Salem December 8, Medford had guaranteed \$15,000 to Washington high in Portland for a second game with the Toledo team. A week after these negotiations were entered into by Medford and after the Portland school had failed to get the game, the Toledo team telegraphed Corvallis that all its other negotiations had fallen through and stating that if Corvallis would make the necessary expense deposit, that the Ohio team would come here. Corvallis immediately telegraphed the money and received the contract.

"We feel that under the circumstances we got the game legitimately," said Mr. McMaster. "Medford certainly could not expect to have unlimited time to obtain the game. Toledo seemed to have the assurance that Medford had failed to telegraph us. That, we presumed, left the matter open to us and we immediately accepted. That's all there is to it and we are willing to rest our case with the state board on the facts."

Salem Boys Charged With Store Burglary

Salem, Dec. 21.—Charges of burglary were lodged against six Salem boys, all of whom were said to be students of the local high school.

The boys under arrest are Howard Hendrickson, Estley Ellis, John Propp, Paul Ehmer, Wesley Putnam and Clarence Clement. None of the boys would discuss the charges preferred against them by the police.

The officers said they had obtained evidence indicating that the boys had entered at least three stores here during the past six weeks, in addition to stealing a number of overcoats from local churches. They had planned other jobs, the police said, including the theft of receipts of basketball games to be held in the near future.

The stores which the boys were alleged to have robbed included those of Ziesel & Cooley, Sample Shop and C. P. Bishop.

The boys worked together, the police said, and conducted their operations systematically.

Ship Building Trade Slumps In America

Washington, Dec. 21.—While administration forces battle in the senate to obtain passage of the ship subsidy bill, the ship building industry of the nation is in a slump, statistics compiled by Commissioner of Navigation reveals. Though slightly higher than in pre-war years, due to delayed commercial work during the war, construction of steel ships during the past fiscal year amounted to only 588,202 gross tons. Compared to this meagre total, 2,000,004 gross tons were constructed in the corresponding period of 1921 which was considered universally as a year of depression in other lines.

MRS. BRUNEN FREED; MOHR IS CONVICTED

Mr. Holly N. J., Dec. 21.—Mrs. Doris Brunen, acquitted of a charge of murder in connection with the shooting to death of her husband, "Honest John" Brunen, was reported recovering today from the collapse at the end of the trial.

Harry C. Mohr, her brother, who was tried jointly with Mrs. Brunen, was found guilty of first degree murder last night in the same verdict that freed the woman.

The jury recommended that he be given life imprisonment.

Mrs. Brunen collapsed in her chair as the verdict was read. As Mohr was led from the court room he called back "Goodbye Doris" and she became hysterical and insisted on following him back to jail.

She collapsed again as deputies elicited handprints on her brother.

Brunen, widely known circus owner, was shot to death as he sat by a kitchen window in his home several months ago.

Charles Powell, former circus employee, testified at the trial that he was paid by Mohr to shoot Brunen.

Judge Kalisch announced today he will sentence Mohr January 8. Attorney for the convicted man expect to appeal the case.

WILLAMETTE FINISHES DRIVE SUCCESSFULLY
