WHEAT FIRM AND BIDS HIGHER
Portland, Jan. 13.—The wheat mar-
ket was pushed up yesterday with
strength and continued demand here.
Western white and soft white were both
advanced 1 cent at the Merchants Ex-
change.

There is a full in export flour trading,
described to higher wheat prices and the
fact that all available steamer space is
booked up to the end of February. Ori-
ental buyers are not disposed to raise
their bids now, but it is believed they
will be in the market again. There is
some inquiry for wheat from Europe
and also from Shanghai, but not at
acceptable prices.

ENGLAND FEARS LOSS OF SEAS SUPREMACY

London, Jan. 13.—For the first time in
centuries England is minus the tramp
cruisers in the game of retaining super-
macy of the seas.

Two new capital ships, planned as the
most powerful afloat and scheduled to be
began this month may remain mere pa-
per sketches in the Admiralty office.

Unless the signatory nations make
haste to consummate the Washington
disarmament treaty, England will find
herself with Japan as a bad second
in sea power, naval experts point
out.

Despite national poverty it was un-
derstood weeks ago that plans of two
new ships would be carried to completion.
This followed the call for the bids on
the part of the Admiralty for the con-
struction of the peerless monsters.

It is now rumored that the admiralty's
opening of bids was in direct discrep-
ant with the instructions of the Lloyd-
George government. The government
had ordered that the program be deferred
for an indefinite period. On its
sudden reversal the admiralty called for
bids. It is up to the new government,
now, to countermand the order or to
scuttling laying the keels.

The Lloyd-George government pro-
ceeded with the scrapping of all the
ships specified in the Washington agree-
ment. By so doing, it is pointed out,
the existing reserve of the British navy
against a possible repudiation of the
naval agreement by other signatory pow-
ers has been destroyed.

This "act of good faith" has pushed
England perilously near the danger
point, the Morning Post declares.
Should a repudiation of the Washing-
ton agreement occur at this time, the
resultant strength of the three great
naval powers would be: United States
41 capital ships; Japan 23 capital
ships; England 23 capital ships.

The United States has not, according
to the Post, taken steps to scrap desig-
nated vessels pending the final endorse-
ment of the naval agreement by the
governments concerned.

Lord Lee of Fareham is quoted as
saying that the only reason the admir-
alty agreed to the scrapping of nine-
teen capital ships by the new govern-
ment was that the other powers should
fulfill their obligations and that two new
ships allowed under the agreement should
be made immediately available.

Either of these promises to the ad-
miralty's condition to sanction the
scrapping program may prove unsound.
But, even though the treaty is poorly
carried out, England will be far behind
unless some means of carrying out the
construction of the two new ships is
found.

After Ratification
After ratification all around, the
United States would possess 20 capital
ships built and building. Five of these
would be the post-Jutland. Japan would
have 10 capital ships, two of them post-
Jutland. England would have an im-
pending total of 22 capital ships. But,
the Post points out, only one of these,
the Hood, would embody the improve-
ments derived from the experience of
the war. The foregoing status puts
England in a distinctly inferior position
to the United States in ultra-modern
ships.

If the treaty is ratified all around,
and if the money for the construction
of the two new ships is forthcoming,
England and the United States will be
on a parity with 20 capital ships each.
Under the agreement England must
scrap four capital vessels upon com-
missioning the pair of new ones. Japan
will scrap two of its new ships. If there is
a quota anywhere the balance is destroyed
and England for the first time will find
herself second in naval power.

France, the naval armory of the world,
has been alarmed by rumors come from
France that the naval agreement may
not be obeyed.

due to the European situation. There
was good export demand.
