

## U FACULTY DEFEATS THE CHANGE IN TERM SYSTEM BY 38 TO 31

Voting 38 to 31 in favor of the term plan, the referendum ballot taken by mail last week and yesterday, the faculty has given its final decision on what is considered one of the most important issues arising in the University of Oregon for a number of years. Out of the 75 eligible to vote, only three failed to cast a ballot, namely, Earl Kilpatrick, Ira Richardson and Carlton R. Spence. The change of faculty majority in favor of the present system is due, according to those counting the votes, more to the members who swing over to vote for the term plan than to the larger vote cast.

The second clause of the ballot inserted to determine the date of going into effect of the semester plan, if adopted, likewise showed a large majority in favor of putting off the change as long as possible. Out of 67 voting, 45 were in favor of 1924 and only 22 desired to make the change at the beginning of next school year.

As far as the campus in general was concerned, the beginning of the agitation relative to the proposed change in the old system of dividing the school year into two parts began when the faculty announced their decision by a narrow majority in favor of the change.

### OPEN FORUM

Waltersville, Ore., Feb. 12.—To the Editor:—I have been reading a good deal about our county commissioners in The Guard. I am afraid too many of us only look at one side. Now the county agent is all right. But it would take several of them to get around to help every farmer in the county. We have a Farmers' union at Waltersville, with over one hundred members. A resolution to reinstate the county agent was voted down two to one. Also, the county convention of the Farmers' union at Camas Swale voted the same resolution down two to one. Why? Because two to one of the farmers of Lane county have received no benefits from the county agent. The different kinds of soil on the farms in Lane county, make nearly every farm a study of its own. Would any farmer try to run a farm that he had never seen and pay the expenses, I guess not. That is the way the work has been done by one county agent. It is about the same with the school supervisor. He only has time to visit each district one or two hours a year. We should have more supervisors. I would like to see our county clerk have a chance. We elected him to handle our county affairs and I believe they can do it if we let them alone.

### Comment Court For Abolishing Offices

The people of the Central community met Saturday evening, Feb. 10, 1923, at the Central hall. E. V. Anderson was chosen chairman of the meeting and F. Petzold, secretary. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, the County of Lane, Oregon, has been burdened with a large number of offices, and whereas, the taxpayers of the Central community believe that to be a step in the right direction and whereas we believe that it is possible to make still further reductions, therefore be it resolved, That we, the taxpayers of the Central community heartily endorse the action of the county court.

"And be it further resolved, That we consider the agitation for a recall of Mr. Sharp and Mrs. Rose to be unneeded for and entirely out of place at this time.

"And be it further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Eugene Daily Guard and the Morning Register for publication. Also that a copy be sent to Mr. Sharp and Mr. Rose."

### Packard Line Will Be Handled In Lane

Another well-known make of motor car will be available to Eugene residents with the establishment of a representative here of the Packard company. Roy O'Donnell, formerly connected with the Portland Motor Car company, of Portland, Packard dealers of that city, has arrived in Eugene and will make his headquarters at the Bangs garage.

Three counties are included in the territory which O'Donnell will cover for his company—Lane, Lane and Benton. A service station for Packard owners will be established here later, Mr. O'Donnell states.

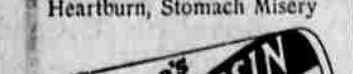
Mr. O'Donnell has moved his family here and is living in the Osburn apartments.

### JAMES JEANS DIES AT FREEWATER, ORE.

James L. Jeans, 70, a native son of Lane county who for the past 35 years has been living at Freewater, in eastern Oregon, died there Sunday. Word of the death was received yesterday by relatives here.

Deceased, born September 10, 1853, on the old home place 10 miles west of Eugene, was a son of Mr. and Mrs. William Jeans and for many years taught school in this county. Scores of Lane residents secured their education at his hands. He married Mary Dent, who survives him, and went to Freewater in 1888. Each year, however, he has been in the habit of spending a couple of months during the winter with his brothers and sisters here.

He left Eugene for Freewater last Wednesday, in the belief that his end was soon coming, after having spent the past three months in Lane. Heart trouble was the immediate cause of death.

Besides his widow and daughter, Mrs. Charles Gilbert of Freewater, at whose home he passed away, he is survived by three brothers, John of Elmira, and Ben and Lee of Eugene, and four sisters, Mrs. Frank Imann of Elmira, Mrs. Hall Madison and Mrs. A. C. Matthews of Eugene, and Mrs. A. P. Crow of Seattle.

Funeral services, it is believed here, were held today at Freewater. It is believed he was laid to rest alongside the body of his son Adrian who died of typhoid fever while serving his country in the Philippines, during the insurrections there.

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## THE AMERICAN CIGARETTE ABROAD

The world will have the American cigarette. It bought 12,000,000 of them in 1922 against slightly more than 2,000,000 in the year preceding the war, and the number of countries to which they were sent in 1922 is 80 as against 50 in 1913. The total value of the exports of cigarettes in 1922 is approximately \$24,000,000 against less than \$3,000,000 in the year preceding the war.

Curiously, too this growing demand for our cigarettes comes chiefly from a section far distant from that in which the war occurred—the Orient. To China alone the exports of cigarettes in 1922 were 8,500,000 against 641,000,000 in 1913, and the sum sent to us in payment therefor from China alone was \$17,000,000 against \$1,000,000 in 1913.

Of course, there was a large exportation of cigarettes to Europe during the war period, especially to France, Belgium and Italy, but

the sales to that continent have greatly fallen off since the closing of the war, while those to the Orient have gone on increasing. While China is by far the largest single customer for our cigarettes at the present time, other Oriental countries are also increasing their demands. The Straits Settlements, which distributes its imports to all parts of the Orient, took in 1922 over a billion of our cigarettes, and Hong Kong, which sends most of its imports into China, took about 600,000,000 in 1922 against 536,000 in the year preceding the war. Siam also shows a growing taste for the American cigarette and our exports to that country in 1922 are more than double those of the immediately preceding year. India, however, has materially reduced her demand, while Japan is apparently not addicted to the American cigarette habit, for our total exports to that country are extremely small and show little disposition to increase.

That the "habit" of the American cigarette is not only a growing one but world wide, is evidenced by the fact that the total number of countries to which our cigarettes were sent in 1922 is approximately 80 against 50 in the pre-war year, 1913, and the value of the exports to the whole world in 1922 \$24,000,000 against \$2,954,000 in 1913.

The total value of cigarettes exported from the United States in the eight years since the beginning of the war is \$165,000,000 against \$22,000,000 in the eight years preceding the war. The "tobacco habit" seems to have been greatly stimulated since the beginning of the war period, as the total value of tobacco in all forms exported from the United States in the eight years since 1914 is \$1,325,000,000 against about \$350,000,000 in the eight years immediately preceding the war.
