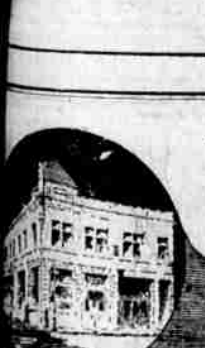

LONDON WILL IGNORE TURKISH ULTIMATUM

London, Feb. 13.—Still without official advice from Ankara that a second ultimatum demanding withdrawal of all British troops from Smyrna harbor has been issued, the British government indicated, through a semi-official spokesman, that no attention would be paid to such an order, should it be received. Matters seemed a little more hopeful following reports that Mustafa Kemal, Ottoman generalissimo, had recently rebuked the Turkish commander at Smyrna for threatening to fire on allied crafts in the harbor.

The Daily Express says it is "officially informed" that a three-day ultimatum was sent to Paris, whence it will be forwarded to London.

received from Cooney, in which it was suggested that Bailin get in touch with "some Jews in Philadelphia or Germany in New York with whom you (Bailin) are connected" and investigate their connection with the bomb plot.

Bailin declared that he knew nothing of the organizations Cooney mentioned and that he believed they were suggested in order to shift the blame from the Burns agency had advanced to unknown parties.

This, Bailin said, would have given the Thiel agency an opportunity to take control of the investigation and obtain money provided for the probe. At the time he received the letter, Bailin was also in the employ of the Burns agency.

Fake Letter Sent.

Bailin testified regarding a letter he had written to the postmaster at New York threatening to blow up the post office. The letter, he said, was instigated by the Thiel office.

He said he sent a copy of the letter to William J. Flynn at that time head of the department of justice. Flynn sent a copy of the letter back to the Burns agency in New York and the witness was arrested, the latter testified.

Burns Denies Charges.

New York, Feb. 13.—Arthur Bailin never saw W. J. Burns. His latest charge is the invention of the most imaginative mind we ever found. There is no truth in his charges," Sherman Burns, secretary of the Burns International Detective agency said here today regarding the testimony in Chicago of Bailin.

"We never gave Bailin any radical literature and we never taught him to use bombs. We had to discharge him because his mind was so active and inventive that we could not place any confidence in him," Burns said.

Bailin, according to Burns, applied for employment in September, 1920.

Public Service Body Secured Its Ends in Rail Decision, Corey

To the Editor:—The interstate commerce commission in its decision granting authority to the Southern Pacific company to acquire control of the Central Pacific, states in part: "We have given consideration to the position taken by the Oregon public service commission and other Oregon interveners, who urge that the issues raised by the complaint of the public service commission against the Southern Pacific company and others be considered in connection with this proceeding."

In our opinion, such issues are not connected with the present issue so that it would be proper for us to pass upon them now. Relief appropriate to such complaint will be granted in due course if justified by the facts presented, and anything herein decided will not, of necessity, limit the scope of such relief."

Natron Cutoff Promised.

"Moreover it appears that the Southern Pacific company has agreed in part at least to the contentions of the interveners from Oregon and that the construction of the Natron cutoff will be commenced in the near future. Counsel for the applicant from the oral argument stated the following:

"So far as we may be bound by anything, we are bound by that declaration of policy and by that resolution of the board of directors which we regard from our side as a contract with the people of the state of Oregon for the completion of that cutoff."

"We have taken note of these assurances. We believe that they are made in good faith and for the present deem it best to leave with the applicant the initiative in this important work."

Chairman R. H. Meyer, Commissioner C. B. Archibald and J. B. Campbell, concurring, say:

"Whatever the objections may be to the inclusion of conditions relating to a project more or less foreign to the subject matter of this proceeding, in view of the representation made by the applicant from this record, a condition requiring the construction of the Natron cutoff might properly be included in this order."

Reopening Provided For.

In granting Southern Pacific company's application the commission imposed nine conditions under which such acquisition of the Central Pacific by the Southern Pacific might be had. The ninth condition was:

"That this proceeding may be reopened at any time by order of the commission."

It will thus be seen that the public service commission has gained everything sought in its petition on intervention before the interstate commerce commission in this controversy.

The Oregon commission filed a petition in intervention for the purpose of safeguarding the interests of the people of Oregon, and for the purpose of bringing to the thought and attention of the interstate commerce commission, the urgent needs of Oregon in regard to the railroad development as reflected in this commission's complaint and by emphasizing the close relationship existing between the issues involved in the Oregon complaint and the issues involved in the Southern Pacific company's petition. In other words, the purpose of intervention by the state of Oregon was that there might be impressed upon the record before the interstate commerce commission the solemn warning that an affirmative disposition of the Southern Pacific company's petition, by which there would be granted the relief sought by the petitioners, unimpaired and without concern of the needs of Oregon would be disastrous to the entire state, likewise harmful to the nation, and would foreclose to the people of Oregon the privileges to which they believe they are rightfully entitled.

Oregon Case Yet to Be Heard.

It will be remembered that this commission's complaint before the interstate commerce commission seeking construction of certain lines of railroad is yet to be heard and that the interstate commerce commission has stated that relief appropriate to such complaint will be granted in due course if justified by the facts presented, and that the interstate commerce commission has done nothing in the present case that will of necessity limit the scope of such relief.

It will further be noted that the interstate commerce commission under condition nine, reserves the right to reopen the so-called merger case at any time. This commission could not ask for a more favorable consideration than that afforded by the interstate commerce commission.

State Unity Lacking.

It is, however, to be regretted that the entire state did not get behind the railroad development scheme. It is our belief that if this state had been a unit, in its support of the interstate commerce commission would have included in its order a requirement for the immediate construction of the Natron cutoff. As it now stands, the Southern Pacific company is pledged to complete the construction of the Natron cutoff, when the construction of railroads throughout the United States is finally determined.

This commission was advised while in Washington, D. C., that the grouping plan would probably not be finally determined for several years owing to the vigorous objections to such grouping on the part of many of the stronger lines of railroads.

Unless this commission is successful in its complaint now before the interstate commerce commission, which is to be heard in the near future, Oregon cannot hope for the completion of the Natron cutoff or any other railroad construction in time to take care of the demands that will be made upon this state's vast lumber resources, and a greater portion of the business will necessarily go to the states of Washington and California where transportation facilities are far more adequate.

Lumber Demands Transportation.

The United States department of forestry advises this commission that the coast will be called upon to furnish an additional eleven and one-half billion feet of lumber annually to support the market which the south will be unable to supply, due to the exhaustion of its timber. Public Service Body Secured Its Ends in Rail Decision, Corey

The commission may, after hearing, in a proceeding upon complaint, require by order any carrier by railroad subject to this act, to extend its line or lines. Provided, that no such order shall be made unless the commission finds, as to such extension, that it is reasonably required in the interest of public convenience and necessity, or as to such extension that the expense involved therein will not impair the ability of the carrier to perform its duty to the public."

Common Usership Condition.

The power and duty of the interstate commerce commission to impose a common usership condition, as was asked to be incorporated in the prayer of the Southern Pacific company was granted, we believe is contained in paragraph 2 of section 5 of the interstate commerce act, which provides that authority for control of one carrier by another may be acquired only if the commission be of the opinion that "it will be in the public interest" and that any order granting such authority shall be "under such rules and regulations and for such consideration and on such terms and conditions as shall be found by the commission to be just and reasonable in the premises."

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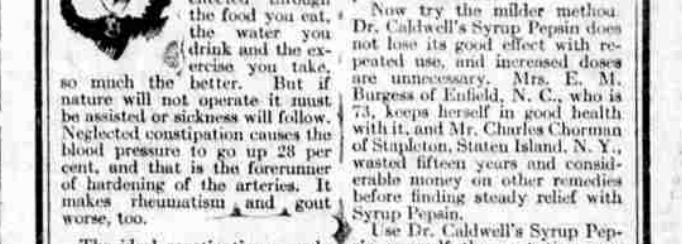
