Charges Price Used Surgeons to Oust Tumor (Continued from page one) told me her spine would grow straight, and for six weeks she claimed she was healed. But a week ago she came back and begged for more relief, and I found the spine still badly curved and a great deal more so than a year ago. Dr. Kellem's said he had been informed this woman patient has since died. "I could give you instance after instance of people claiming to be healed," continued the letter from Dr. Shaw, "and falling under the power which were not to me in a cruel and inhuman when healing does not come to lay it on a lack of faith. You may quote my name and this letter if you wish, for I believe in the right and this thing is wrong." To Confess Revelation. "The so-called modern divine healers condemn the employment of doctors and the use of medicines as a lack of faith in God," said the evangelist. "Yet nowhere does the Bible condemn the work of the doctor or the use of medicines. The purpose of divine healing was to confirm revelation. This was always the purpose of the healings of the Lord and the early church and there is not a single exception to this rule. The purpose of modern healing, so-called, is not to do this but to get a crowd and a large amount of money. Healing was not the prominent thing in the work of Christ or the apostles. "The modern so-called divine healer limits the power of Christ to the faith of the one healed," he said. "This is always the position of those who claim they are healing in the name of Christ. There can be no healing unless there is faith on the part of the individual. But faith was not at all necessary in the healings of Christ or his apostles. The case of the man with the withered hand (Luke 22:51) or the case of the lame man in Acts 3 all illustrate this fact. Christ and the apostles could heal whether the one healed had faith or not. The fact that the modern divine healers demand faith shows that the power by which they do their work is the power of suggestion and hypnotism, or every scientific man knows. No Organic Trouble Healed. "Christ healed all kinds of diseases. There is not one authenticated case on record where any so-called modern divine healer has ever healed a cancer, or any organic trouble. There are many lies told but no proof backed up by a reputable doctor. "Christ's cures were instantaneous. Those whom He cured were cured of the worst diseases and immediately. The modern healer tells his people that the cure will come gradually, that it may take a month or more for it to come. "Christ's cures are permanent. The people who were cured by Him were cured. These cured by the modern healers are cured for a little while and then the old trouble comes back worse than ever. "The cures of Christ turned people to righteousness but those of the modern healers turn to inanity. There is an abundance of testimony that there are scores today who have lost their minds because of the modern fad. (Here Dr. Kellem's read several letters from doctors concerning this point. "That they are making some cures no one will deny. These cures are the same kind and are made in the same way as those made by hypnotists and psychologists everywhere. These are making cures and are not claiming they are divine. They are honest in that they speak of the power as simply a scientific thing." In conclusion Dr. Kellem's said: "The new testament gives us absolutely no foundation for a belief in miraculous healing today. Not only is this true but it exactly states that these miraculous manifestations would cease when the revelation was confirmed, the church established and that which was perfect was come. Three Things Demanded. "We have a right to demand today of any man who claims to heal in the name of Christ that he do three things: "(1)-That he heal the same kind of diseases as those healed by Christ and the apostles. "(2)-That he heal them in the same manner as Christ and the apostles healed. "(3)-That he produce the other signs which always accompanied the gift of healing and which were the attestations of the divine mission of those to whom they were given. The signs were: "A-The power to speak with intelligible tongues. "B-The power to raise the dead. "C-The power to pick up deadly serpents without being harmed. "D-The power to drink poison. "E-The power to claim to heal in the name of Christ cannot produce these signs we must conclude that he does not have the divine power by which they are produced. "If one today cures the same diseases and in the same manner as those cured by hypnotists, suggestionists, etc we must conclude that he does it by the same power as that which they employ. "The new testament method of healing is that we use the means at our command, asking God to bless them. This is the whole Christian view of the question." Dr. Kellem's stated as did Dr. Stivers the other night that the First Christian church was in no way responsible for the coming of r. Price, that it had opposed the movement from the start, that it was not in it now and never would be. Tonight Dr. Kellem's will speak on the theme, "The Cleansing Blood of Christ."

The number of subscriptions bear eloquent testimony to the splendid work done by the men who composed the different teams, say the campaign managers. Many of these men gave great blocks of their time; several gave all of their time for several days last week, and all of them rendered valuable and efficient service, as the number of subscriptions testify. The board of directors feel very grateful to all of these men for their loyal support and are confident that they will stay by the task until it is finished.
