NEW ROAD ROUTE ACROSS CASCADES BEING SURVEYED

Anticipating the construction of a new road through the mountains from Eugene to Crescent, through the Cascade and Deschutes national forests, 54 miles of the new survey for the project which will be known as the Willamette highway have been completed under the supervision of the United States bureau of public roads. The total length of the new highway will be 117 miles.

The district of the new survey across the Cascades follows in the neighborhood of the old military road built in the early days during trouble with the Indians. A steep and dangerous grade is eliminated on the west side of the mountain. The road will open up a richly timbered area and give entrance into a paradise for hunters, fishermen and campers. Summit and Crescent lakes, abounding in ducks and geese, and Waldo and Odell lakes, will be made accessible. The distance between Eugene and Crater Lake will be reduced by means of the new road by more than 150 miles, and will afford the shortest possible route from the Willamette valley to Klamath county.

Chief of the road survey party, C. R. Short of the bureau of public roads, who is in charge of the location, reports seeing from 15 to 20 deer every day in the vicinity of Rigdon after the snow had driven the animals from the mountain heights to the more sheltered valleys.

Fourteen miles of this project between Goshen and Lowell are now under contract by the state of Oregon for grading and surfacing. The seven miles section between Eugene and Goshen is already graded. The remaining part of the survey, amounting to 42 miles, is expected to be completed by June 1. No federal funds have yet been allocated for the construction of the project, which, through the bureau of public roads, is being carried on in cooperation with the state of Oregon.

Willys Production Pushed At Toledo

Trainload after trainload of Overlands and Willys-Knights that have been crossing the desert and the mountains headed for California and the Pacific coast, state since the first of the year prove the popularity enjoyed by Willys-Overland products on the Pacific coast.
Behind all this shipping activity at the great Toledo plant and mainly responsible for the prominent place held by Willys-Overland among motor producers is the fact that John N. Willys has himself taken over once more the entire direction of the manufacture and production of the famous cars bearing his name. In fact Willys declares he is out for a killing in this 1923 year-of-great-promise and is going to see to it himself that his company gets it.
It is like old times when he put Overland on the map by his personal efforts to see this wonder on the job. It has been new to the who face in personnel. How John Willys started Overland and a showman and brought it in a few years to its proud place among the leaders is one of the industry's romances.

In 1908, 465 cars were built at a profit of \$58,000. The next year sales jumped to 4,645 and put Willys a million dollars to the good.
To make a long story short the value of the Willys-Overland company in fifteen years rose from \$7,500 to \$100,000,000. That, it is still going strong, may be seen from sales last year doubling those in 1921 with 1923 promising to run out the biggest year in the company's history.

Big is the demand for Overlands and Willys-Knights on the Pacific coast. It may be judged from actual shipping statistics available for Southern California.

On January 16th thirty-seven car loads reached Los Angeles. They were loaded before their arrival. Four days later another load, this time of 60 freight cars, arrived. So quickly were they sold that on January 27th the Los Angeles branch sent a hurry call to Toledo for another trainload to be shipped at once.

The retail sales the first day of the showing of the new models were remarkable, 90 at Toledo, 87 in Los Angeles. New York's show netted 230 retail sales.

Asylum Salaries Cut By Legislative Action

State House, Salem, Feb. 21.—The first fight on appropriation bills broke loose in the house and lasted close to the noon adjournment. This was a losing fight, led by Representative Kay against the \$25,000 cut in the appropriation for salaries in the hospital for the insane.

Kay argued that a rank injustice was being done the institution by this cut, and that it was based on opposition or personal feeling against Dr. Steiner, the superintendent. He charged that the hospital is being treated unfairly in comparison with the provision made for the eastern Oregon hospital for the insane, and that criticism against Dr. Steiner should be directed against the state board of control, if the persons making the charges were in earnest.

In the discussion it was stated that Dr. Steiner has leased to the institution 100 acres of his own land, and that inmates are being used to clear the land, thus necessitating the employment of more guards, etc.

Kay's motion to go into committee of the whole to amend the bill was lost by a vote of 39 to 20, and the bill passed as presented by the joint ways and means committee.

No Compulsory Jury Service For Women

State House, Salem, Feb. 21.—The senate yesterday by a vote of 18 to 12 defeated the bill sponsored by Representative Mrs. Simmons, making jury duty on the part of women compulsory.

The vote on the bill follows:
New—Senators Brown, Clark, Dunn, Edwards, Ellis, Fisk, Garland, Hare, Johnson, Joseph, La Follett, Maglady, Ritzer, Smith, Staples, Strayer, Taylor, Zimmerman.

Ayes—Senators Cabrett, Dennis, Farris, Aves, Scott, Corbett, Deane, Fackelsen, Robertson, Toose, Upton, Eddy.
Senator Kinney sponsored the bill as representing the wishes of the women of the state who desired to be placed on an equal footing with men in respect to jury service. Replying to a query from Senator Taylor as to the response of women of Umatilla county to the call to jury duty, Mrs. Kinney admitted that the women of Umatilla county had not shown any eagerness to serve on juries but laid this to the fact that "the women of Umatilla county have not yet awakened to their civic responsibilities."
