George Mosby bought a new Ford coupe, and M. Zimmerman a Ford touring car Tuesday of Woodson Brothers.

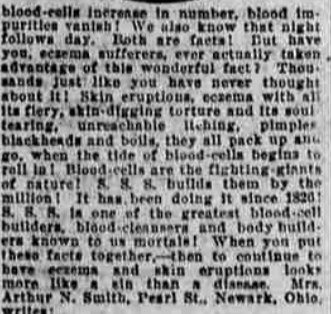

An ordinance amending Ordinance No. 465 was passed by the common council and approved by the mayor June 29th, 1914.

The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove does ordain: That ordinance No. 465, passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor June 29th, 1914, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:—By amending Section 6 of said Ordinance to read as follows:—

Section 6. No motor vehicle shall be run or propelled within the corporation limits of the City of Cottage Grove at a greater speed than 20 miles per hour, provided that in passing the public school buildings and for one block on either side thereof, at street intersections, and within 150 feet of any railroad crossing, the speed shall not be greater than 12 miles per hour.

That section 11 be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 11. No vehicle shall be permitted to turn on any of the streets within the corporate limits of the City of Cottage Grove, except at street intersections.

That section 12 of said ordinance be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 12. It shall be unlawful for any person in charge, either as owner, operator or driver, of any vehicle to permit such vehicle to turn on Main Street in the City of Cottage Grove between the track of the S. P. R. R. and a line 60 feet east of the Coast Fork bridge from 6 o'clock a. m. to 6 o'clock p. m., except on Sunday, for longer period than one hour, and it shall be unlawful to park any vehicle at any time within 15 feet of any fire hydrant, within 15 feet of any intersection, or within 60 feet of the east approach of the Coast Fork bridge on Main Street. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on 5th street, for 40 feet south from Main Street, or on 9th Street or on Main Street across the entrance to 9th Street.

It shall be unlawful to park any automobile or other vehicle on that portion of any street opposite to that portion for which the street committee has obtained permission from Common Council for use for storing material for building purposes.

Parking limits may be established temporarily by the street committee of the Common Council whenever deemed necessary, by putting up signs indicating the prohibited district.

That said Ordinance be further amended by adding to Section 15 to read as follows:

Section 15. In backing an automobile out of garage or other building said vehicle shall be headed in the direction it would lawfully take on the street, and in no event shall it be backed past the center of the street. It shall be unlawful for one vehicle to overtake and pass another either at a street intersection or on a bridge.

Said Ordinance shall be and the same is hereby further amended by adding Section 16 to read as follows:

Section 16. In case of the sounding of the fire alarm, all cars and other vehicles shall be parked at the nearest convenient point and so remain until fire fighting equipment has passed, and no vehicle shall approach nearer than 200 feet to any fire until after same is under control and fire fighting apparatus removed from street.
