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MANY TURNED AWAY FROM ARMORY WHEN PRICE REVIVAL HELD

There was a big crowd in attendance at the armory last night the occasion being the healing service conducted by Evangelist Price.
It is not known how many failed to gain admittance, but the doors were locked as early as 7 o'clock and a great many must have arrived after that hour.
At the afternoon service, Dr. Price announced that it would be necessary, in all probability to conduct a healing service Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. as he hoped to pray for all who requested it and that the regular healing service would be held on Thursday at 7:30 as was done a week ago.
There will be a 2:30 service today and night the meeting will be held at the Baptist church, owing to the armory being used by the O. N. G.
At the afternoon service yesterday, Dr. Price paid his respects to the man who is seeking salvation because of his polish, culture and morality. "If one man can be saved by adopting such a course," he said, "then the whole world could adopt it and there would have been no need of calvary." "It is my belief, reinforced by scripture," he said, "that it cannot be done, and I believe that unless a man accepts the Lord Jesus Christ as his personal savior, he is lost absolutely."
"It is given out that it was regrettable that people must be turned away from any of the services, but owing to the limited capacity of the armory building, there was nothing else to be done."
Rev. McCrossland, pastor of the Presbyterian church of Albany, offered the opening prayer, after which the choir hummed "Nearer My God to Thee," which had a very sobering effect upon the vast audience.
One of the big boosters of this campaign is Rev. Mr. Dryer, of Lodi, Cal.

an old friend of the Prices, who led the singing last evening.
Mr. Dryer is full of praises of the Lord, and his genial smile is very much in evidence. Mrs. Dryer is a close second of her husband and lends a great deal of assistance on the platform during the healing services. Everybody was admiring Secretary Rodriguez's brand new spring suit last evening. Mr. Rothgeb is well liked by all.
Dr. Price again announced that seat reservations would have to be made in the center section for the Albany folks who are expected on Friday night. He said that it would be "Albany night" and that he must make their visit as pleasant as possible. It was stated by Mr. Kelly, man of the Baptist church at Albany, who was present at both afternoon and evening services yesterday, that he could not give any definite figures as to how many would come to Eugene on Friday evening, because of the transportation problem. There were plenty of them who would be pleased to come if accommodations could be provided for their journey.
Dr. Price continues to hammer away at the spiritual death in the church of today in all his sermons. He says he knows what he is talking about as he was once as guilty as any of them. He recently told of his church activities as pastor of the Congregational church at Lodi, Cal., and said that he got it into his head that what the church needed was something to attract and hold the young people of the church and so he had installed in the church pool tables, bowling alleys, etc., and preached everything under the sun but the four-fold gospel.
Since his conversion which took place fourteen years after ministerial work, he said, he wished to emphasize the fact that the pulpit should not be used for anything else besides the preaching of the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. "Get the people saved," he said, "and pool tables and such like can be junked."
Last evening Dr. Price said he wished to make a bold statement, but it was true nevertheless, and that was that there is not a man, or woman in Eugene suffering from cancer, tumor, rheumatism, etc., whom the Lord could not heal. The only condition attached to this is their getting right with God. He stated that the Lord would not heal anybody unless it is for the glory of God.
Between 60 and 70 were prayed for at last evening's service.

Commenting on the knockout of Bill Brennan by Firpo last night, Dempsey said:
"I know and have said that Firpo was a good fighter. Brennan is not as good as he used to be, but still is mighty tough and Firpo must have been a fighter to stop him. I am ready to fight any man any time a promoter can put the bout on in a satisfactory manner. Firpo, of course, is not hurt."
New York, March 13.—With a right arm that hangs on like a fence, post and swings with the effect of a battering ram, Luis Angel Firpo, the giant of the Argentine, knocked out Bill Brennan, the former Chicago heavyweight, in the twelfth round last night. It was a bout arranged to show what the South American giant could do and the verdict around the gathering places of the mitt profession this morning was:
"That fellow's going somewhere."
Firpo acted in the last round much like the bulls that his fellow countrymen used to stab for pastime before he brought to them their first glimpse of the prize ring. Facing defeat from a more crafty and a ring-wise opponent, with his balloon-like sides puffing and his eyes-glassy under a crimson film, Firpo tore into Brennan and by brute force beat him to the floor.
