RALPH SPEAROW IS AWARDED KOYL CUP BY U.O. COMMITTEE

Ralph Spearow, member of the varsity track team and one of the best pole vaulters in the United States, was tonight named as the recipient of the Koyl cup which is awarded each year to the "best all-around man of the junior class." The cup was presented by Chas. W. Koyl, a former student of the University of Oregon, and is awarded each year to the man who, in the opinion of the committee on awards, is the best all-around man in the junior class. Last year the cup was won by Ralph Couch, varsity basketball player.

In athletics Spearow is pre-eminent, standing close to a world's record in his special event, the pole vault, and ranking as high point winner of the Oregon track team last season.

He is a self-supporting student, maintaining himself, his wife and baby daughter through his work as pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Cottage Grove. These duties have restricted somewhat his college activities outside of athletics.

In his personality the committee believes Spearow represents the highest type of college man and will do credit to this institution.

Spearow entered his first regular track meet while a student of Lincoln high school in Portland in 1914 and won first place in the pole vault at 10 feet 7 1/4 inches in spite of the fact that the week before he had broken his toe and in falling after a vault.

Fall Creek Road Work Under Way

Work on the Big Fall creek road above the Fall Creek postoffice is progressing in fine shape with 22 men at work on repairing new road construction work and the bridge there of 90-foot span, reports H. E. Vincent, assistant supervisor of the Cascade forest, who returned this week-end from several days spent in that district. If possible this season, a six or seven-mile additional road will be built up the valley from the present road, which is being repaired over a five-mile stretch, he said.

The work now under way is above the junction of Big Fall and Winberry creeks, the road work being under supervision of Ranger C. B. McFarland, the bridge construction under J. E. Dammwood. Six men are building the bridge. Another bridge of slightly more than 40-foot span is projected on this road still farther up the creek.

COMPLETED NEW HIGHWAY THE WILLAMETTE

Survey for the Willamette completed, according to the file of the bureau of public lands department of agriculture extends from Eugene to the Cascade mountains to the Klamath county. The new road is 89.7-mile section between and Lowell. The first highway is paved. The road from Goshen to Lowell is paved and surfaced by the state.

Side of the mountains the south side of the middle Willamette river as far

as Oakridge in order to avoid the Southern Pacific railroad (Natron cutoff) which is on the north side of the river. From Oakridge to the summit the survey extends along the north side of the river. The maximum grade is 5 per cent and the greatest curvature is 28 degrees for outside and 56 degrees for inside curves. The cost of construction is estimated to be below the average for mountain road construction.

The new survey reduces the distance from Eugene to Crater lake by more than 150 miles and opens up a richly timbered area. A wonderful scenic drive is made possible around Summit and Crescent lakes and numerous camp sites are to be found along the Willamette river.

No federal funds have yet been appropriated for constructing a road on this survey, but Lane county has voted \$152,000 in bonds to be spent between Lowell and the summit.

The survey was completed by the bureau of public lands in co-operation with the state of Oregon. Chief of Road Survey Party C. R. Short of the bureau of public roads was in charge of the location.

Therefore, while they are going to fight it out with sugar govt and try to make it impossible for such conspiracies to succeed in future they are not going to encourage the boycott or buyers' strike as a principle of American economics or politics.
