N. Y. DRY REPEAL HELD O. K. BY DR. BARNETT

The recent act of Governor Smith of New York in giving his approval to the prohibition act in that state has no constitutional aspects, according to Professor J. D. Barnett, head of the department of political science at the University of Oregon.

"The states do not have to cooperate in such matters with the national government," said Professor Barnett. "They are under no constitutional obligation to do so. It would seem to be more a matter of patriotism and loyalty than of unconstitutionality."

The repeal of the act undoubtedly will be of great significance in the extent of the enforcement of the federal prohibition laws in New York, in the opinion of Dr. Barnett. The Miller-Gage law, the state prohibition law passed concurrently with the federal amendment, provided for the arrest and trial of those persons transgressing the law, and brought offenses against the state law within the jurisdiction of the policemen in New York cities. Notably, the policemen in New York will still have the authority to arrest under the national laws, but in actual fact they will not arrest, Dr. Barnett believes.

"To adequately enforce the federal laws they would need hordes of deputy marshals sent by the government," he said. "Cases will now be tried in the federal court, but they will probably never reach the court, as the policemen will be unable to handle the work and arrests will not be made."

Wisconsin is following New York's example, and other states may. Barnett believes that all of the states have now passed state laws concurrent with national laws in the matter of prohibition and these states will of course be unaffected.

BELIEVE MONEY WILL COME FOR 'U' CLUB

That \$20,000 instead of \$10,000 will be donated by the Masonic grand lodge of Oregon, now in session in Portland, for a clubhouse near the University of Oregon campus for the Craftsman, is the belief of prominent local Masons who have been behind the move. The two lots necessary for such a building have already been purchased.

A resolution to set aside \$25,000 will be introduced at the grand lodge session, it is said here. If the \$20,000 is secured, it would go toward construction, furnishing and maintenance.

L. J. Crouch, Emory Lake and Percy Green are delegates from Eugene lodge No. 11, A. F. and A. M. Jack Maglady and Robert Callahan are also attending the sessions.

Lane Farmers Urged to Inspect College

Farmers of Lane county are reminded of the annual inspection tour of the Oregon Agricultural college and experiment station this week, and are urged by W. A. Ayres, a circular letter sent out today, to attend and find out what the experts are doing there in trying to solve the farmer's problems. Friday is the day set aside for Douglas and Lane county men to visit it, the crop and animal departments especially. A special meeting with program of interest to farm women has been prepared, so the entire family is invited to motor down with basket lunch and spend an instructive holiday. About 150 went from Lane county last year.

Junk in Alleys to Be Cleared Away

A general cleaning up of the city business district is under way. Chief of Police Jankins is now inspecting the rear of store buildings and ordering boxes, barrels and trash stacked in the alleys removed. Sidewalk signs and iron posts at the corners of downtown streets were generally cleared out Tuesday. The corners not already painted with "no parking" signs and white lines of parking limits will be repainted white.

"Visitors here see the junk piled in the alleys as well as one the street fronts," said the chief this morning. "So we're moving it out. It makes truck moving in the alleys harder as well as the bad appearance."

MASON HEAD RAPS KLAN

Sioux City, Iowa, June 13.—The flying of the Ku Klux Klan by the grand master of the Iowa Masons, F. W. Glaze of Oskaloosa was the feature of the opening session of the grand lodge of Iowa in Sioux City today.

Glaze declared there was no excuse for the existence of the Ku Klux Klan and that the officers chosen by the people were the only persons who should enforce the law. He declared Masons ought not to give any aid to the clan and said that all clan meetings should be barred from the Masonic halls of Iowa.

LOWER RATES POSTPONED

Washington, June 13.—The Interstate Commerce Commission Tuesday postponed from July 16 to September 17 the effective date of its orders in the Anson, Gilkey and Hurd and West Coast Lumbermen's cases, decided last January, involving extensive adjustments in lumber rates.

The Anson, Gilkey, Hurd and West Coast Lumbermen's cases, referred to in the Washington dispatch, were decided January 16 and granted adjustment of rates on saw and doors shipped from the Pacific northwest to points west of Chicago. The case was started in 1914.
