Einstein Theory to Be Tested This Fall

San Francisco, June 13.—Further tests of the Einstein theory of relativity will be made in connection with a total eclipse of the sun early in September by astronomers of the Lick observatory of the University of California, it has been learned here.

Dr. H. Wright, chief astronomer, and the expedition, which will be headed by William H. Crocker, member of the university board of regents, will leave for the eclipse site in the state of New Mexico, about 120 miles south of San Francisco, on the extreme southeastern portion of the state.

EUGENE ELEVATOR AND MILL ENLARGED

Work of rearranging the machinery of the Eugene Mill and Elevator company plant at Fifth and Mill streets is being pushed with all speed by Manager T. D. Harmon and George Dahl of Portland, expert superintending the installation and remodeling, to have the wheels all ready to turn at a greatly increased capacity July 1. The Beaver mill across from the Southern Pacific railway station is being dismantled as fast as possible and its equipment moved to the elevator plant, having been run at increased capacity to grind enough feed ahead to supply trade during the remodeling and moving to the elevator.

The capacity of the elevator's 10 large bins and the feed storage space is about 70,000 bushels. The grinding capacity of the machinery when completed will be about 50 tons daily. It is planned to start with two shifts of men, adding about six men to those previously employed, and going to three shifts this fall if necessary. A force to three millwrights and six carpenters is engaged at the job.

The separator and reel from the Beaver mill was moved over earlier this week and the oat clipper and greater, the cracker, the attrition wheel and the mixer are being transferred as fast now as possible.

Bend Clothing Store Burns; Loss \$12,000

Heroism of Willard During Flood Is Told

Ponca City, Okla., June 13.—Jess Willard, one time heavyweight champion and hero of the flood which swept the famous 101 ranch near here, told his own story today of his thrilling fight with the surging waters.

The big Kansan, who swam the raging flood and carried women and children to places of safety, modestly disclaimed any credit for what he had done.

"I didn't do much," big Jess said. "It was hard work, though, and there were many narrow escapes. What hurt me most of all was to see the helpless horses and other livestock swimming about everywhere, without being able to help them."

at times and their eyes would beg so pleadingly I was tempted many times to attempt to rescue them, although it would have been useless."

Colonel Joe Miller, wealthy owner of the 101 ranch, said Willard was the first man on the job when the flooded river sent a wall of water swiping about the ranch buildings.

"Jess worked from 3 o'clock in the morning until midnight," Colonel Miller said. "After the women and children were saved, he turned his attention to the terror-stricken livestock, swimming frantically about in their enclosures to escape drowning."
