

MARTIN AND IODINGS
ERECT NEW BUILDING

A new one-story building of hollow tile construction, costing \$5,000 or more, is being planned to house the auto service, repair and accessory shop now operated by E. J. Iodings and Lester M. Martin at 44 Seventh avenue east. It will be constructed by Stein Brothers on property between Park and Pearl streets just south of F. M. Hathaway's garage, where an old frame building occupied by a blacksmith shop is to be torn down. With driveways from both streets, the 30x14-foot building will be made up in the best of modern garage type, the owners say.

Martin and Iodings bought this property recently from W. W. Calkins, president of the United States National bank and S. M. Calkins, local attorney. Martin will handle the tire and service end of the shop, having been engaged in that line here the past year and a half. Ray Reinheimer, who has been in the auto repair shop for the past year, will help Iodings on that branch of the business.

Portland, June 13.—The wheat market was weak yesterday and very dull. July bids at the Merchants' Exchange were 2 cents lower on all grades. No trading in cash wheat was reported.

Butter Prices Holding.

An easier undertone was reported in the butter market, but there was not much change in the prices offered for good cubes.

Eggs were firm with receipts lighter. There was a good demand for poultry and light hens were quoted higher.

Dressed veal was also firmer with sales at 12½¢/12¢.

Sugar 20 Cents Lower.

A 20-cent decline in sugar the first in several weeks, took effect in the local market yesterday. Con. granulated is

listed at \$10.45 a hundred with the usual discount.

CHICAGO GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, June 13.—Grain prices rallied in the late afternoon and under the leadership of wheat closed higher on the Chicago board of trade today.

A good class of wheat buying followed receipt of unfavorable crop news from Kansas, Oklahoma and parts of Texas, where excessive rains have caused rivers to inundate farm lands. A strong Winnipeg market caused by higher cash prices and advices that crops are in unfavorable condition due to cool weather also had an effect on trade sentiment.

The heaviest fly damage is extensive in the southwest, according to the government crop report. The Illinois winter crop was estimated at between 60,000,000 and 62,000,000 bushels compared with 55,025,000 bushels last year.

Corn received good local support on the dip and that, with the firmness in wheat, caused prices to firm up. Country elevators had sufficient supplies to meet trade requirements. Kansas City and other southwestern markets reported a market decrease in orders. Feeder demands were light.

Oats were dull but retained some of their earlier losses in advances induced by gains in other grains.

Lard remained weak throughout the session while ribs maintained a strong undertone.

COUNTY FAIR FUNDS

Salem, Ore., June 12.—Apportionment of the county fair fund aggregating \$50,574.00 has just been completed by Secretary of State Koser. This fund is created by a levy of one twentieth of one mill on the taxable property in each county in the state. Where no county fair is held in the county the fund may be diverted to road purposes.
