Integrated Societies, Klan Leaders Quarrel

The new hinges largely on possession of the official seal of the federation for the little yellow tickets of endorsement, so potent in recent elections. Wilson faction admittedly has the march on the supporters of the other morning a little yellow ticket for John Wilson and William C. North, and bearing the official seal of the organization, put in its appearance.

Fearful Howl Results.

Once a fearful howl went up from North faction. It was all wrong, said it was a mistake, a fearful mistake. The Wilsonites have no right to the official seal of state, they cried in stentorian tones.

Because of the ticket also projected the angle into the campaign. The "used voters to authorize the \$75,000 bond issue sponsored by major members of the board."

Wilson had come out flat-footed and the bond issue, North has refused to commit himself. And that is the crux of the matter.

The fracas between the two factions involved itself into a game of "seal, who's got the seal?" with President Judge Hewitt of circuit court in the role of adjudicator.

Suit is Filed.

The court phase was entered when U. Walker, as a director of the Federation, filed suit against W. C. Elford demanding the seal, and asking an injunction prohibiting Elford from using the seal in any documents or writings.

The yellow ticket that bore the election of Monday morning bore the inscription:

This is the only authorized Patriotic seal in the city of Portland for the election of June 16, 1923.

Wrong, all wrong, mourned the supporters as they hid themselves from the courts.

North admittedly has the backing of the Ku Klux Klan. The official Klan newspaper has come out strongly in support of him and Chairman Woodard. There is at least a difference of opinion, if not a gulf of dissension.

State Grange Endorses Pierce and Income Tax

A concerted campaign for the defense of the state income tax law and the oleomargarine bill will be conducted by the Oregon State Grange before the next election, at which time these measures are to be voted upon. It was decided at the annual session of that body, held during the last week at Newport. Committees to cooperate with the various organizations which are formed in defense of these measures are to be named to carry out the wishes of the grange body.

One of the most spirited elections ever conducted by the grange took place in the election of George Palmeter of Hood River as master. It required both the first, second and third choice votes to make the election. F. M. Gill, Dufur; T. J. Kreyer, Lent; A. J. Frank, Carleton, and P. O. Powell of Monmouth were the other candidates. M. C. Glover

of Eagle Creek was elected a member of the executive committee.

C. E. Spence, for a number of years head of the grange, resigned his position and intends to devote his time to the office of state market agent.

Resolutions endorsing Governor Pierce's efforts toward the reduction of taxes, and endorsing state-owned banks, elevators, cold storage plants and warehouses were adopted.

FEDERAL LANDS OPENED

Roseburg, Ore., June 12.—Little interest was shown here yesterday in the government land opening. Approximately 204,000 acres of Oregon and California and Coos bay wagon road grant lands were thrown open to homestead entry, but the excitement and interest which marked former openings was lacking. At 10 o'clock when the office opened there were between 25 and 50 men present, the great part of them being lessees, who under the terms of the act have a right to purchase. There were also a few squatters filing under the preference

right which they hold.

Only a few ex-service men are here investigating the land, and the filling from this class of applicants are expected to be light, as only a small part of the land, although classified as agricultural, is adapted to cultivation. All applications between June 11 and June 30 will be treated as simultaneous and a drawing will be held on July 6 to settle contests. From July 2 to October 1, ex-service men will have a preference right period and none others may file. Between September 20 and October 1, however, other persons may present applications but these will be considered as having been filed simultaneously on October 1.

COAST BUTTER ON STEADY BASIS

Portland, Ore., June 13.—A sharp advance in butter prices was registered in the past week at San Francisco when 92 score sold 2c higher on Tuesday. Dealers lacked confidence in the advance and, although the general tone of the market was firm, a decline of 1 1/2c occurred Wednesday and Thursday. Some dealers expect a further drop of 1/2c to 1c this week. However, there appears to be little chance of any large declines. At present prices it is not profitable to ship fancy butter from the east, although some inquiries have been sent to Chicago. Receipts at San Francisco showed gain from Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Utah and Idaho, but California receipts were no heavier. The into-storage movement still exceeds the withdrawals. Total holdings at Portland, Seattle, Los Angeles and San Francisco are approximately the same as last year. The available supply of top grades is getting lighter, while medium and undergrades are more plentiful and the range in price between scores is expected to become greater. Butter scoring 92 points advanced 1c from Friday to Friday, closing at 44 1/2c, or 7c above 1922. Los Angeles closed at 46c net.

The eastern markets opened weak and continued that way till almost the close when the weakness gave way to more strength.
