DEMAND FOR WHEAT CEASED

Portland, Ore., June 21.—The break in the eastern wheat market put a stop to the little wheat buying that has been going on in this territory. So slack was the demand that no bids were made on any grade at the Merchants' exchange.

Good Local Demand for Eggs.

Eggs remained firm, which reduced receipts and a fair local demand. A lighter make of butter reported by city creamerymen would indicate that the flush season is about over. There was a good supply of surplus eggs on the market, but the proportion of extras was not large.

Poultry was firm and dressed meats easier.

CHICAGO GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, June 21.—Led by corn, grain prices advanced at the close on the Chicago board of trade today.

A late rally in corn strengthened by unfavorable crop news, brought heavy buying in wheat and prices recuperated most of their early losses after reaching new low values on the present crop. Export business overnight was estimated at 1,000,000 bushels mostly direct.

Good local support caused corn prices to show further advances. The Kansas report placed the condition of the crop in that state at 78.8 on an acreage of 5,630,000, an increase over the previous estimate.

CANNERY IS VISITED BY OREGON GROWERS

Officers and members of the Oregon Growers, traveling by automobile on their caravan trip to Medford, dropped off in Eugene today for a bite to eat and a trip through the Eugene Fruit Growers' association plant here. The string of cars entered town at the noon hour, having stopped at Monroe to look over the Oregon Apple company orchard there. After lunch they were escorted through the local cannery, for which they had high praise, by J. O. Holt, manager. On their way south they dropped off at Creswell and inspected the plant there. They were due at Sutherlin at 4:30 o'clock and were to spend the night

at Roseburg. The return trip will be made Saturday. They left Salem at 8 o'clock this morning.
