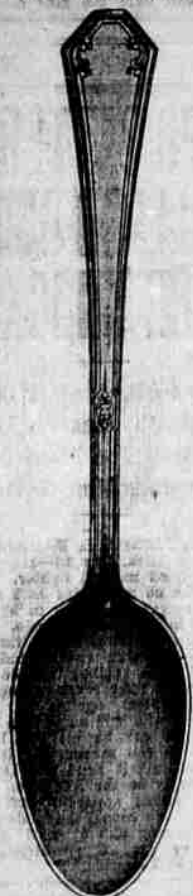

KELLY PROPERTY
AT OAK RIDGE IS
FAST DEVELOPING

Colonel George H. Kelly has just made his new mill property a visit and finds the work progressing nicely. The name for the new town, which develops rapidly, has not been decided. Temporary houses are going up day by day.

Al J. Sullivan, the superintendent of work and secretary of the company, says they are going to build an up-to-date town and want the best men and are going to pay the top local wages to get them. They are paying \$1.50 for common labor now and are putting men to work as fast as they can get houses built to accommodate them.

The Kelly interests bought a strip of land 1/2 mile wide on each side of the North Fork of the Willamette and will build a railroad back eight miles in the first stretch. They have the finest body of timber in the northwest and it is big enough to keep them running for 15 years.

Jeans Takes Eugene
Garage Repair Work

The repair department of the Eugene garage, on Fifth avenue west near Wilamette street, has been taken over by J. D. Jeans who bought the business this week-end from A. S. Peterson. Peterson will occupy the new addition to the building, owned by E. G. Quinby, which will be completed in the near future for occupancy, and devote all of his time to the Oakland agency sales and accessories work.

Jeans has been in the garage repair line here for eight years or more, part of the time with Peterson as workman in the Oakland agency shop here. He has just returned to Eugene from Veneta, where he has been connected with like line of work only slightly for the past few months. Peterson has been established in the Eugene garage for the past three and a half years. The new part of the building, to be ready August 1, is to be fitted up for show room and service department.

Approximately 500 longshoremen have quit work to protest the conviction of 27 fellow radicals on charges of criminal syndicalism with the result that every lumber ship in San Pedro is tied up today.

Freight vessels and oil tankers have been unaffected so far.
