COUNCIL PLANS

WAR ON EARWIG;
TO DOLE POISON

Like weed is broadcast on land, care being taken to get it into corners, thorough out grassy lawns, weedy corners, and buildings and about heaps of wood, etc.

Citizens Asked to Help.

Cooperation of citizens to carry out instructions to the best of their ability is asked by the council and the county.

Since the earwig devours foliage, lawns, flowers, berries and other fruits, and also clothing. It is much worse than bedbugs and citizens will doubtless be only too glad to do their share. It was felt,

the earwig breeds best in rubbish such as should be cleaned up anyway, according to Stewart, so the city health committee and department, headed by Councilman A. L. Williamson and Dr. S. M. Kerron, health officer, expect to give little leniency to those that fail to clean up their premises of harboring places.

Old rags, bedding, hay, rubbish, in sanitary conditions under buildings, all must be cleaned up to prevent giving the pest a place to breed.

Since the earwig will by the middle of next week begin to hibernate and retire from active life for this season, to breed and multiply and spread enormously by next year, the hasty action taken was

deemed necessary at once.

The council and County Judge C. P. Bernard, who came into the council session late but who agreed to throw his influence behind the eradication program for the county's share, considered quick action well worth while here, in view of the fact that Portland is spending \$10,000 this season in earwig extermination.

Although the county fruit inspector's force has power to eradicate the earwig and put a lien against the property in each case, it was thought better to fight in the way outlined, as Portland, Seattle and several other cities have done. The lawful course is long and cumbersome.

Directions Given by Expert.

Substantially the following directions for eradication are given in B. B. Fulton's bulletin, published recently as an official entomologist at the Oregon Agricultural college:

Earwigs can be controlled at small cost of money and labor and must be eradicated as a menace to the fruit industry of the state. Wherever the pest abounds, residence and other property values drop.

A mixture is made by dissolving 12 ounces of sodium fluoride in six quarts of water, stirring in two quarts of molasses and 12 pounds of wheat bran. The mixture should be scattered thinly over rose plots by throwing with a free arm swing, strewn more thickly around edges of buildings, along the edges of walks, fences, carriages, trees and other hiding places. It should be applied in the evening just before dusk, as the earwig works during the night.

Clean Up City-Wide.

Do not sprinkle the lawn for two or three days, as a good wetting down washes out all the poison. Follow up several times later during the season to get the few remaining earwigs by leaving pellets of poison smeared on trees, scattered along walls and fences and in cracks of barns at intervals of about every six feet. The formula for this follow-up poison, which is designed so that it will not dry so rapidly, includes one ounce of sodium fluoride, five ounces of molasses (a third of a pint), five ounces of glycerine, five ounces of water and about a pound of oat hulls.

The poison is injurious to humans and poultry and should be put on trees above children's reach, scattered on the ground where they will not find it and tossed under buildings and along board walks and fences in such small bits that it is not noticeable. It may be washed away after two or three days be thoroughly spraying the lawn.

Cleaning up rubbish of every sort in city-wide campaigns is the most effective toward eradication.

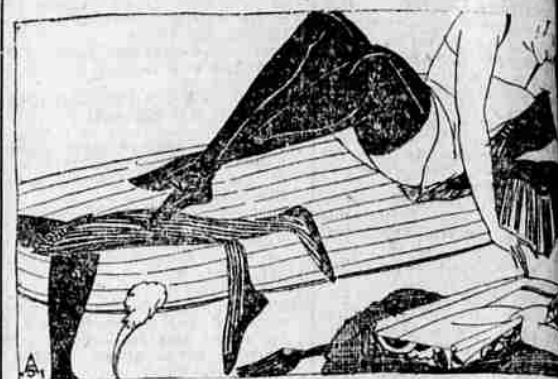
