IMPLEMENT BARN OF CITY BURNED; LOSS NEAR \$5000

Fire, thought to have been set inadvertently by a hobo near the hay chute of the city barn at Third and Lincoln streets about 10:15 o'clock Wednesday night, gutted the left and south wing of the building and burned street department implements, resulting in a damage of approximately \$5000, it was estimated after hurried checking today by C. D. Farmer, street superintendent. Insurance carried, totaled \$3000. The building, of which the first floor is only scorched, belongs to W. J. Williams.

Most of the heavy implements and valuable machinery of the street department were saved by quick work and by having been parked in the yard instead of run into the barn for the night. About \$1000 is the largest single loss, on the street flusher, which cannot be replaced for less than \$3000, Farmer thinks. By quick work, the asphalt paving plant just installed by the city on adjoining property was saved and fired up this morning to continue repair work under way on city thoroughfares.

In the dry hay about the chute leading down from the left the fire started about a quarter hour after Farmer had made his usual inspection of the place at 10 o'clock before retiring for the night. Twelve tons of good hay put in this week was consumed, the roof burned out and second floor decking charred, the hay falling on implements in the south side of the structure and greatly damaging street flushing wagon, squeegee machine, gloves and destroyed two carts of fire hose and several barrels of asphalt.

Both horses, stalled on either side of the chute where the blaze started, were saved, although one big sorrel knocked Farmer down during their rescue from flames spreading under them. It is E. Farmer, son of the superintendent, managed to get them out. A veterinarian is taking care of the one horse badly burned.

Things saved included the paving plant and the asphalt plant, the steam roller, the gasoline tractor, a hay wagon and a dump wagon, a Ford truck and a small Ford car.

Flying sparks several times started blazes in nearby wood yards of the Booth-Kelly company and about an hour after the fire had been begun by firemen an oil-soaked coat in an auto half block down the street was found afire and stamped out. Firemen hooked two lines of hose at the plug directly across the Southern Pacific tracks and held up switching for some time. The fast work of Fire Chief Nussbaum's men saved the lumber yard and other endangered property, as well as saving much of the contents of the city barn and yard.
