FORMER PRINCE FORESEES OUTBREAK

Doorn, Aug. 13.—Frederick Wilhelm, former crown prince, foresees an early outbreak in Germany—a communist uprising, followed by a counter-revolution through the fascist, which will mean civil war and anarchy.

The deposed heir to the Hohenzollern throne expressed these views in an exclusive interview with the United Press, while visiting his father, the former emperor, at his residence in the Netherlands.

In view of the serious situation developing in Germany, coupled with the various rumors growing out of the visit of the crown prince to Doorn, the United Press correspondent journeyed here to obtain first hand the impressions of the former emperor on the political situation in his country.

Interview Granted. The interview, obtained just before Wilhelm left Doorn to return to his exile retreat at Weimar, was granted by the former crown prince as he stood beside his little red motor car in one of the streets of Doorn. Dressed in a light-colored suit and a straw boater, he pulled a silver cigarette case from his pocket, asked the correspondent to join him in a smoke as they talked and then unhesitatingly answered all questions as he discussed in detail the affairs of the fatherland.

"I am not pessimistic of Germany's future," said the crown prince. "He was then told of the rumors concerning monarchist activities, following his arrival in Doorn, but shook his head. He admitted that he longed to return to Germany, but insisted that the only idea back of this longing was the desire to devote his energies to his family and quiet administration of his estates."

"If, through some movement, a situation would arise as a result of which a plebiscite might call you to the throne, what would you do then?" he was asked. "The former crown prince shrugged his shoulders."

"There is absolutely no sign of such a movement," he responded to such a question. Here Frederick Wilhelm propounded a question often heard in Germany. "How long will America wait in the north in Europe without intervention?"

"America has the French at her mercy because France is so heavily indebted to the United States," he went on. "America could compel France to alter her course through irresistible pressure as a creditor."

The prince inquired as to the views and likely course of President Coolidge, displaying great interest in the policies of the new American executive. "Then reverting to conditions in Germany, he continued:

"I view the present situation with extreme anxiety. The terrible slump of the mark and the threatened coal shortage present possibilities of serious riots. I have talked with many bankers, but none see a way out."

"I expect the communists to seize the opportunity presented in the deplorable situation to make a push very soon. This will lead to a counter action by the fascists, which will mean civil war and anarchy."

"But I am perfectly aware that the nationalist renaissance which is apparently growing stronger throughout Germany, does not contain any elements of a monarchist movement."

Continuing, Frederick Wilhelm expressed grave concern over the food shortage that would likely result in Germany owing to the internal clashes. He foresaw a resumption of conditions that prevailed in Germany during the war, but emphasized anew that he was taking no part in the movements in the fatherland.

"I am interested only as an onlooker," he went on, "but an onlooker who loves his country with all the passion of his heart, whose hands are tied."

Admires Ruhr Resistance. The prince expressed admiration for the firm resistance shown by the people in the Ruhr. He said he was convinced that if the Berlin government slackened its resistance, the people of the Ruhr would not continue to hold out against the French occupation.

Commenting significantly upon what he termed France's acts of violence, he declared:

"Force creates counter force and acts of terrorism will be the only natural reaction to France's terrorism."

Frederick Wilhelm showed himself to be especially well posted on British politics. He regarded the successes of the laborites in England as of greatest importance.

Reverting to American politics, he inquired particularly as to the prospects of the election of Henry Ford. The prince said he still retained his often expressed desire to visit America, but now doubted whether this would ever be possible.

At Doorn, while the prince was visiting his father, was also his sister, the Duchess Victoria Louise of Brunswick. This was the first time Victoria Louise has visited Doorn since the second marriage of the former emperor and was marked by a reconciliation between the Duchess and Princess Hermine, her stepmother.

The report came out a few days ago that Adams was thinking of entering the derby in the pool from which comes political position. The former chairman of the state highway commission came out hurriedly with a denial.

Florence Duffy Sues Husband for Divorce

Suits for divorce have been filed by Florence Marjorie Turner against William Duffy Turner, through her attorney, H. E. Slattery.

The two were married in Douglas county on December 17, 1914, complaint says, and since that time the husband has turned and struck his wife, and has threatened to kill her.

HALF DOZEN STATES FIGHT GASOLINE COST

Chicago, August 13.—War on high gasoline prices was waged by Attorney General and governmental agencies in a half dozen western states today.

Governor McInnes of South Dakota, whose victory started the movement, went ahead with plans to sell the fuel through state depots to prevent an increase by the big companies.

Governor Nestor, North Dakota, withdrew to his telegram to the Standard Oil company demanding similar prices. Governor Charles W. Bryan, Nebraska, made similar demands to the Standard and is considering operation of state-operated filling stations.

Governor Lee Small, Ill., is investigating the situation while Governor Kendall of Iowa is studying the South Dakota plan. Standard Oil officials here indicated that a price cut impends in Kentucky. Wisconsin dealers met today to discuss a price cut.

In Milwaukee and other cities automobile clubs are considering plans to establish their own filling stations, while in a half dozen or more cities the gasoline retailers themselves are participating in price cut wars.

Milwaukee Seeks Cut

Milwaukee, Wis., August 13.—The city of Milwaukee has today started a campaign for a 15-cent cut in the price of gasoline for 135 cents a gallon for low test and 14.8 for high test in an effort to drive down prices here.

Five thousand dollars worth of the fuel will be distributed to the public through a city filling station Mayor Haun announced.

The price represents cost and is about 10 cents a gallon less than present filling station prices.

Local motorists interviewed this morning expressed their pleasure to see where Governor McInnes will be requested to ascertain from South Dakota's governor the exact means used in forcing a gasoline price cut in that state. They hold the 23 cents charged here to be much too high, in view of the fact that water transportation, the cheapest possible means of conveyance, is used to bring it to Portland from the oil fields of Southern California. They believe that prices may well be lowered again.

Some declare, and the story so far has not been denied by any company announcement, the Oregon division of one prominent oil company has been told to cut prices five cents a gallon just before bringing it to Portland from the oil fields in California. This concern did not follow orders, it is said, but only lowered the price two cents as did its competitors.

SWIMMER SAVES TWO BUT LOSES OWN LIFE

Seattle, Wash., August 13.—After making a heroic effort which saved the lives of two women, struggling against the strong undertow off Juniper beach, Camano Island, Sunday, James Parker, Redding garage man, sank exhausted just as a boat arrived to rescue him. His body was not recovered.

LINVILLE, FEDERAL PROHIBITION DIRECTOR, IS VISITOR HERE TODAY

On his annual inspection tour of the state, when he holds conference with sheriffs, prosecutors and other law enforcement officials, Dr. J. A. Linville, federal prohibition director for Oregon, was in Eugene this morning.

With him is Roy C. Lyle, federal prohibition director for Washington. The two are accompanied by H. L. Barker, operator of the Oregon department. While here they consulted with Sheriff Stickle and Prosecutor Johnston, and called on local law stores that are licensed to handle alcohol to check up on stocks.

They go south from here to the Oregon line, and then to Klamath Falls and up north through central Oregon.

While in Eugene, Lyle noticed the name of E. J. Adams in the paper. He acted on a "hunch," looked up Adams and found him, an old acquaintance of 20 years ago "back east." Lyle and Adams had quite a time of it today, renewing old acquaintances.

TWO EUGENIANS IN CLIMB UP MT. HOOD

Two Eugeneans were among the 58 in the Maxima party that established a new record when a 100 per cent climb of Mount Hood was made late last week. W. C. Yoran and Mabelle Hair of this city were with the group of mountain enthusiasts that scaled the summit of that famous peak.

Forty women were in the party that left Camp Lee, at 6 o'clock in the morning and reached Hood's crest at 2 o'clock that afternoon. Two score of the group had never before climbed a snow-capped mountain. All reached the top, which is considered remarkable. This is the first time such a large party made a 100 per cent climb.

LOCAL PARTY FIRST ON MIDDLE SISTER

A party of Eugeneans, consisting of Alice Young, Marian Taylor, Donald Young, Eugene Chadwick and Elmer Maxey, were the first people to climb the Middle Sister this year. They scaled the summit Sunday, reaching the top at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

Saturday night they camped out at Scott lake, and started with the dawn Sunday. They report a fine trip, no accidents and excellent road. They came down the McKenzie in four hours, reaching Eugene at 11 o'clock Sunday night.

The government is building excellent highway at the summit, they report. They got through as the party was an official Chamber of Commerce inspection party. Chadwick is chamber secretary here.
