Deputy Collectors Back—
J. J. Rockwell and W. W. Allingham, deputy collectors of internal revenue headquarters here, have just returned from Tacoma, where they attended for the past 10 days the conference of Oregon tax collectors. They were given instructions and good stories made component parts of the conference program.

Sheriff Makes Perfect Record—
Eighteen motor vehicles have been stolen in Lane county the past year, and all of them, recovered, according to a report made out last night by Sheriff Stickels. This 100 per cent record is unique in police annals; as seldom is the entire number recovered. Some of the machines were found as far away as Paso Robles, California.

City Pump Installed—
A new DeLaval pump has been installed at the municipal power sub-station on Eighth avenue at the river and is in operation this week for the first time. The machine has been ordered some time and replaced a pump used as relief when the regular apparatus breaks. This machine, which throws about 2,000,000 gallons of water a day, is coupled to pump from the filtered wells to the reservoir on Skinner butte.

Caps Great and Small—
A cap built to fit the head of a titan, or perhaps the dimensions of a headpiece believed to indicate the enormous state of expansive mind, is to be kept in the window of the J. C. Penney company. The head suitable would have to be about 18 inches or more in diameter. Along with the same gigantic cap are several tiny ones, all of fine workmanship, but fitted for dolls of medium size. Naturally the passing crowds stop to see what else is in the display.

Y Boys Enter by Groups—
Further plans are being worked out by the Y. M. C. A. officials here for taking the memberships of boys from various Sunday schools in groups, as enrolled in their Bible school classes, and giving a reduced rate on this basis. It is learned from W. P. Walter, boy secretary.

FARMER UNION SALE OF STOCK PLANNED

Final details of the increasing capitalization of the stock of the Lane County Farmers' union feed mill and warehouse corporation were worked out by the directors in meeting at the plant here Thursday. The directors decided at a recent meeting to raise the stock from \$5,000 to \$15,000 and the permit to do this was reported at the meeting as having been received the previous week-end. Plans to push sale of the stock were laid.

The completion of the addition to the rear of the plant here on Olive street near Fifth avenue will be effected shortly, it was reported. This increase will add about a third to the floor space in the feed mill and warehouse. No further progress has been made by the directors toward establishing a union warehouse at Creswell or elsewhere in the county, as authorized in the previous meeting. Directors present included D. R. Hogan, C. E. Jordan, W. H. Andrews, and E. C. Jackson. E. E. Morrison, manager of the mill, was also in attendance. D. Laird, president, could not attend.

Westinghouse Graveyard Is Hit at Fair

Where is the sting of Death, and where its victory?

Death is a sorrowful thing, and graveyards are sorrowful places. There are all kinds of graveyards. Some of them contain loved ones long departed, some of them the poets tell us contain buried hopes and aspirations—but some of them contain—batteries!

The graveyard which the Westinghouse company erected at the Lane county fair along side of their booth is called the graveyard of buried hopes of the neglected motorist.

A snow-white fence, 16 inches high, surrounds a tiny plot of ground probably six feet square. Over it to the rear of the plot, stands a warning "Does your battery haunt you?"

Underneath this warning, stands the graveyard of batteries, for various reasons, written on their tombstones, lie silent forever.

Directly below the warning, which is adorned with a skull and crossbones, stands a monument inscribed, "In memory of Short Circuit, age 17 days."

Each separate grave bears an inscription on its headstone. They run as follows:

"Worked to death; undersized, age 5 months, 7 days."
"Killed by dope, age 3 months."
"Died by being abused, age too young."
"Died from overcharge, age 8 months."
"An orphan, forgotten by gods, age 10 weeks."
The first one, "Rest in Pieces," tells its own story.

Motorists, take heed, and remember that "your batteries will haunt you, if you don't watch out!"
