PIRATES HAVE GREAT TIME; CAPTURE CITY'S POLICE CHIEF, OTHERS

Either Pendleton or Coos bay needs more police officers.

That, at least, is the conclusion reached by the delegation of Eugene business and professional men who were at the Southern Pacific depot Thursday afternoon to welcome the Pirates, Coos bay's new marching order of boosters enroute to the Pendleton round-up, and who witnessed the kidnapping of half of Eugene's quota of peace officers by that bloodthirsty crew from the coast country.

Officers Are Imprisoned

A series of drills, yells and songs by the brilliantly uniformed organization, and then a rush and the capture of Police Chief Judd's, Deputy Sheriff Roach and State Traffic Officer Bloom. The galaxy of "constables" had no more been placed in solitary confinement in a Pullman smoking compartment than Eugene Chadwick, chamber of commerce secretary, and his scribe, there to cover the story felt heavy hands on the scruff of their necks and they too, were thrown into the traveling dungeon and told their next stop was Pendleton.

The prisoners, anxious for revenge, prompted several of the Pirate guards to capture W. H. McClain, Southern Pacific special officer who helped "frame" the kidnapping, but the gang didn't know but one of that name, so captured and imprisoned J. A. McLean, proprietor of the Geigys and Smeed hotel. Finally, however, they got the other who's name sounded so similar, and also got Deputy Sheriff Earl Humphrey while they were about it. The ruffled feelings of the captured were soothed to some extent when the train was stopped at the Monroe street crossing and all forced to walk back to town.

Prank Results Enjoyed

Members of the Pirates laughed loud and long when told how the telegram giving "news" of the holdup at Cushman, excited newspaper men and sheriffs all over the northwest. Luke S. May of Seattle, president of the Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs, was among the first to get the train. It was explained, forced to join the Pirates, sworn by oath and, with a three-foot cutlass at his throat, was forced to sign the "hold-up" telegram that caused such consternation for a time.

FLOURING MILL TO INCREASE ITS CREW

So great has become the volume of flour milling and feed grinding at the Eugene Mill and Elevator plant here that extra hours are being added to the regular run of each class of machinery by T. D. Harmon, manager. Grain is coming in from the harvest in large quantities now and still greater increases are being made in the running time this month.

With two shifts in the flouring mill, the plant will run 10 hours daily beginning Monday and may go to three eight-hour shifts later this fall. Harmon says, "This extra three hours of running will be taken care of by a flour miller to arrive this week-end from Portland. Twelve men are employed now."

The feed milling machinery is now running a shift and a half daily, beginning this week, and it is hoped to increase the business with the on-coming winter demand until two crews are necessary to take care of the business. Although the feed business was quiet this summer during harvest it is already beginning to pick up and a crop of weather will give it a large push in volume shortly, Harmon says.

While the feed ground here is all for Lane county consumption, the flour is made to a considerable extent for foreign markets. Four carloads of flour in double sacks have already been shipped to Portland this month for loading onto boats in the export trade.

The farmer has received more money at the local elevator this fall than he would at Portland by shipping. It was learned from Harmon, who points out that the plant here buys only for its own milling, not for other mills. Of course the former with the early wheat gets a better price, naturally when the elevator of the country wish to buy enough to stock up and get in operation.

Bench Warrant Out For Robert L. Good

The Dalles, Ore., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—A bench warrant was out here today for Robert L. Good, formerly assistant cashier of the National bank of The Dalles, indicted by the grand jury for the theft of one \$500 liberty bond. Friends here expressed the belief that Good would return and face the charges as soon as he learns of the warrant.

Bad Check Artist Gets 60-Day Term

A. W. Glendennin, lanky youth of the bell bottom trouser type, was sentenced to 60 days in the county jail this morning by Acting Justice Harold J. Wells, for passing several bad checks. Glendennin was arrested by local police several days ago, and turned over by them to county officials.

LEAGUE DEFEAT MADE COMPLETE

 Geneva, Sept. 21.—Mussolini's victory over the league of nations was made complete today when the assembly approved the action of the council in voting to submit to a commission of international jurists the question of the league's competency in the Greco-Italian dispute.

It was understood that until the last minute Italy threatened to quit the league should an unfavorable decision occur. Many delegates wanted to assert the league's competency, but were overruled. As far as the league is concerned the whole question becomes a closed incident.

FORD IS NOT RUNNING

Montreal, Sept. 21.—I am not running for or against anything," said Henry Ford when asked if he intended to run for President of the United States, according to an interview published in the Montreal Herald yesterday. "You know," he added, "your colleagues across the border will copy everything you print. They have been asking me questions for a long time."

Mr. Ford passed through this city en route from his home in Detroit to Seal Harbor, Maine, where his family is at present. He said he was neither a republican or a democrat.

"They will have to show me a difference," he said, "before I will affiliate with either party. They are both tarred with the same brush." Asked what he thought of prohibition, Mr. Ford said that the law should be obeyed, adding, "they should put the army and navy on to it."

which closed the program.
