Budget Is Completed For Cottage Grove

Cottage Grove, Ore., Sept. 21.—The budget of the estimated expenses for this city for 1924 is practically the same in amount as this year's budget. It has been completed by the committee consisting of the mayor, councilmen, and seven appointed citizens.

The total for running expenses, new work, interest and sinking fund to be raised by taxation is \$22,634.00. This includes \$750 more in the sinking fund than last year, \$100 less for new work, and about \$100 less for running expenses.

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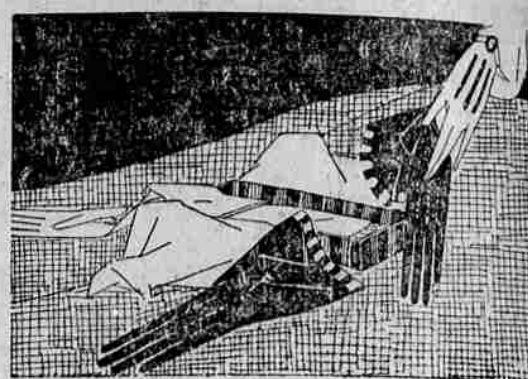
