FIFE, DRUM CORPS OF '61 PLAYS HERE

A grey-haired remnant of that once powerful body, the Union Army in the Civil War, came to Eugene today to sound martial music from fife and drum in a rally far different from that of '61. Then they played for country, today and tomorrow they play for church.

A half dozen, lost of the fife and drum corps of Oregon's Grand Army of the Republic, arrived early this afternoon from the north to assist in rally day services for the First Christian church Bible school. While their "day's work" is not until the Sabbath, they were not niggardly with their music and gave downtown Eugene a treat seldom experienced when they played from the truck that met them at the train, and later in concert on downtown streets.

All plans have been completed for the big rally day service, says Rev. E. V. Stivers, pastor. Cars will be donated to bring to church those who cannot get there of their own accord. A goal of 1700 has been set for attendance. It is expected this will be exceeded by a hundred or so.

The fife and drum corps is being entertained by the G. A. R. and allied women's organizations of Eugene at the armory this afternoon between 3 and 5 o'clock.

NASH FOUR SEDAN INTRODUCED HERE

The first 1934 model four-cylinder five-passenger Nash sedan to be brought to Eugene was sold this week to A. H. Underwood of this city, according to an announcement by the local Nash agency. The car was delivered Wednesday.

The new Nash is one of the smoothest running and neatest appearing four-cylinder cars seen here this season. On a trial trip the car purged down the city streets with a grace that was a revelation to witnesses of the demonstration. The motor is one of the most quiet and smooth running of four-cylinder cars on the market.

The car is well-upholstered and has an extremely neat finish throughout. Other models of the 1934 line of Nash cars, both fours and sixes, are declared to be correspondingly fine.

Marjory Hutton was cleared of the charge of illegal possession of liquor when a justice court jury, trying the case before Acting Justice Harold J. Wells, late Friday afternoon returned a verdict of not guilty. Her companion, R. Z. Evans, cook at a local restaurant, was found guilty. J. C. Wray, member of the jury arrested the evening of October 3 by Constable John Marsh and Deputy Van Staveford, and previously been fined and sentenced.
