IRRIGATION BONDS ARE TURNED DOWN

Salem, Oct. 12.—Action on the application of the Jordan Valley irrigation district in Malheur county for the certification of \$400,000 in bonds by the state irrigation officials was deferred by the commission in session here Friday afternoon, pending a survey of the situation by State Engineer Luper and a report by that official to the commission.

While the commission feels that the state is morally obligated, through promises of past commissions, to extend state aid to the project the impression prevailed among the members that the requested bond issue was too high. Material reductions, it was felt, should be made in the estimated cost of construction on the project, including the contractors' bid of \$225,000 as well as in the claim of \$15,000 for attorney fees.

Cut is Ordered.

Governor Pierce, chairman of the commission, made it plain that approximately \$100,000 should be cut off of the estimated needs of the district for completion of the project, which already has been partially developed as a Carey act project. The district contains approximately \$82,000 acres, only 11,000 acres of which is irrigable.

Fred Palmer, Jordan valley banker and stockman, gave it as his opinion that lands in the district would be worth from \$65 to \$70 with irrigation and a full water right. Others present at the session gave it as their opinion that the lands under irrigation would be worth as high as \$100 an acre.

Certification of \$20,000 of North Side irrigation district bonds was approved by the commission, this amount to be used in completing the development of the district, which is already under irrigation.

The commission also approved certification of bond issues of \$120,000 in the Shasta View irrigation district \$120,000 for the Malin irrigation district and \$100,000 for the Dee irrigation district, all based upon the approval of the attorney general as to legality.
