WALL veterans from the time of the Civil War through the World war gathered at the armory yesterday for luncheon at noon preceding their participation in the Armistice Day parade and the patriotic program of the afternoon. Civil War veterans and their wives were special guests of the veterans' organizations. Many of the veterans were of recent conflicts who are affiliated with the American Legion, Spanish-American War Veterans and Veterans of Foreign wars.

Credit for the preparation and serving of the luncheon made possible by the American Legion is shared by five women's organizations. The American Legion, the Ladies of the G. A. R., General Lawton auxiliary No. 4 of the Spanish-American War Veterans, auxiliary to Lane county Post No. 3 of the American Legion and Springfield auxiliary to the American Legion No. 40. There were 235 veterans seated at the large tables in the dining room which was decorated with many American flags. Quantities of flowers were used on the tables.

Immediately after the luncheon the company took part in the parade and afternoon's program.

that it was impossible for him to gratify his ambition and he ultimately tendered to me the position as director of war risk insurance. I accepted the position with much misgiving, especially after interview with Colonel Chalmers Jones, my predecessor, and with the expressed desire on my part that I might retire from the office at the end of a year.

"Among the first difficulties I encountered was the insistence of Brigadier General Sawyer of his plan to hospitalize all disabled veterans in the ramshackle and tumble-down cantonment buildings throughout the country."

"They were living in cantonments and contract hospitals, many of which were fire hazards," said Forbes.

Forbes said he called for the most insistent and immediately pushed a vigorous campaign of adequate hospitalization.

MELVIN HANSEN SUES MANAGER OF TOURIST GROUNDS ON HIGHWAY

Suit for \$2000 damages was filed this morning by Melvin Hansen, local realtor and owner of Hansen's auto park near Springfield, against Jonathan P. Rucker and Augusta Rucker, caretakers and lessees. Hansen alleges that Rucker's mismanagement of the place has cost him that much in profits.

The Ruckers failed in their contract to him. Hansen alleges, rendered no monthly accounting or any other form of settlement, kept no books, refused to pay for improvements made as agreed in the contract and refused to surrender the real property at his demand. The complaint also says Rucker drove tourist business away from the camp by cursing and swearing at patrons. Other alleged shortcomings on the part of the defendants are also listed.
