Omaha, Neb., Nov. 21.—An insurgent group in the newly formed national independent progressive party today bolted the executive conference here during an argument and the proposed candidacy of Henry Ford.

Headed by J. A. H. Hopkins, chairman of the "committee of 48" the insurgents held a meeting of their own Tuesday night, refused to endorse Henry Ford as the party's candidate for the presidency and considered holding a national convention in St. Paul May 30, 1924.

The "regulars" under the leadership of Roy M. Harp, sponsor of the party, went ahead with the meeting, endorsed Ford for president and voted to hold a national convention in either Denver or Omaha next year.

The faction favoring Ford as the party's candidate voted to approve the name "people's progressive party."

S. P. ASKS ISSUANCE EQUIPMENT BONDS

Washington, Nov. 21.—The Southern Pacific company today asked the interstate commerce commission to authorize issuance of \$23,100,000 equipment trust certificates to help finance the purchase of new equipment at a total cost of \$37,200,000.

Operators Of Trucks Protest Load Limits

Truck owners and operators are protesting the county court's order limiting loads to a maximum of 300 pounds per tire per axle on gravel and macadam roads in Lane. Late Tuesday afternoon a delegation of truckmen called on county officials and declared they could only operate at a loss should the order be strictly enforced.

Proprietors of small sawmills say they will lose money if they can't haul larger loads. Oil companies declare they will be seriously handicapped.

One of the alternatives, it is said, would be to use lighter and cheaper trucks with smaller tires. These smaller tires, in the opinion of P. M. Morse, county engineer, would tear up roads faster than big 14-inch tires, which have a tendency to pack roads.
