Grant Timber Lands In Lane-Douglas Sold

Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 21.—A sale of 68,780,000 feet of government timber was made Tuesday by the Roseburg land office at a public auction at the federal building. The sale netted the government \$90,000. The land lies in Lane and Coos counties and is a part of the Coos Bay wagon road and Oregon & California railroad grant lands in the vicinity of Coos Bay and Eugene.

The Booth-Kelly lumber company of Eugene bought the largest tract, containing 25,000,000 feet of timber, the price being \$44,962.50.

Another sale will be held on December 21, the land being in Douglas, Lane and Coos counties.

Other buyers of the timber today were Fred Fischer of Marcola, bought a tract of O. & C. timber land for \$1,053,041; Suedstrom Brothers, Noth, O. & C. lands, \$3,687.38; Coos Bay Lumber company, Marshfield, wagon road lands, \$8,291.55; Coos Bay Lumber company, Marshfield, O. & C. lands \$4,398.00; Mast Brothers, Lee, Ore., wagon road lands, \$8,547; Crosby & Iverson, Gravel Ford, Ore., wagon road land, \$4,319.82; Dennis McCarthy, Marshfield, wagon road lands, \$8,935.38; George H. Chaney, Coquille, wagon road lands, \$6,162.70; A. L. Gray Veneta, Ore., O. & C. lands \$219.59 and W. J. Corcoran Marshfield, O. & C. lands \$2,835.65.

California Prunes Cut Cent Straight

Salem, Ore., Nov. 21.—A straight reduction of a cent a pound on all of its carry-over crop of 1922 has been announced by the California Prune & Apricot growers association, according to word received by M. J. Newhouse, assistant general manager of the Oregon Growers association. This price reduction is made according to information for the purpose of making a quick cleanup on the old crop, the apparent intent of the association being to stabilize the market for the 1923 prune.

The reduction hits only certain sizes, is the California carry-over is depleted in some sizes.

The new prices on the 1922 crop are as follows:

Sunsweets—50s, 7½ cents; 60s, 6½ cents; 70s, 5½ cents; 80s, 4½ cents; 90s, 3½ cents.

Growers brand—All one-fourth of a cent less than the Sunsweets.

In the Sunsweets the California association is completely out of 20s, 30s, and 40s and so is making the cut in that brand on the smaller sizes only, while in the growers brand there are still some 40s.

All of the prices are f. o. b. dock at San Francisco and the reduction makes the prices exceedingly low, so low that there is every evidence the only reason for the cut is to make a quick cleanup of the crop. General Manager Mortensen of the association stated recently that if the 1922 crop were out of the way the 1923 crop would be sitting pretty on top of a good market, and he is carrying out his prediction with a move to bring about the condition he desires.

The Oregon association has no carry-over of prunes now, but many private packers are holding rather heavy quantities. Just how the new price reduction from California will be met by them is not known.

Newhouse stated today that the cut will continue the possibility of the market for a time, but should have eventually a good effect.
