New Trial Is Allowed In Brauner-Pyle Case

Order setting aside the old judgment of \$48, and allowing a new trial, was handed down by Judge G. F. Skidmore in a circuit court today in the case of J. A. Brauner vs. Guy F. Pyle. The order was made on the petition of Williams and Bean, attorneys for the plaintiff. E. L. McDougal represents the defendant in the case. The court held that the jury disregarded the evidence in allowing \$48 damages in that testimony showed Brauner lost \$5 daily wages for 30 days because of his injuries, and also \$54.35 damages to his machine. The case involved an auto collision.

Trapping Charge Is Dismissed By Wells

After a brief hearing today, Judge Jesse G. Wells in justice court dismissed charges of trapping without a license that had been preferred against James Goodman of the Poodle creek district, northwest of Noti. It was held there was not enough evidence to warrant the charge. Charles A. Hardy appeared as counsel for the defense. Goodman has been in the county jail since his arrest last week.

The train will make the return trip immediately after the game, leaving here at 5:30 and getting into Portland at 9:15. Indications are that an especially big crowd will be coming down from Portland for this year's home-coming and game it is said at Oregon Electric headquarters.

McAdoo Forces Claim Conservative Victory
Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 21.—Forces supporting the candidacy of William G. McAdoo for the presidency claimed a "convincing" victory for conservative Democrats on practically complete returns from the county proposal convention held through South Dakota Tuesday.
Returns from approximately two-fourths of the total vote of the state showed delegates instructed to support McAdoo had won by about 2 to 1 over delegates pledged to Henry Ford.

Speakers from western states pledged their assistance to the effort of the south to obtain federal assistance in reclamation work.

Everett, Wash., Nov. 21.—J. Lane, 36, fellow prisoner with Jack Montgomery, did not attempt to escape Barrington county jail last night, it was de-cloped today.
Lane, after Montgomery had battered his way through a brick wall to freedom, crawled through the aperture in search of Marshal Henry Kenan to warn him of the jail break.
Montgomery has not been found. He used a piece of gas pipe to demolish the interior of the new structure and hid Lane over the head with it when the latter attempted to persuade him from his intentions.
