

HABEUS CORPUS WRIT OF BOBO'S DISMISSED

Habeus corpus writ by Robert Bobo, imprisoned early in October on a liquor charge and without trial in the meanwhile, was dismissed by Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court this morning.

The law does not expect a district attorney to drop all orderly business to try a defendant charged with any specific violation of statute, the judge said, and in that light the defendant could expect trial during the several weeks following his arrest when the district attorney was busy with criminal cases in circuit court.

Walter B. Jones represented Bobo in court today. Gordon Wells had been attorney for the prisoner up to about two weeks ago.

Bobo was jailed in the now famous "movie studio" raid near the state game farm.
