HARRISBURG

Harrisburg, Ore., Nov. 21.—Funeral services for the late A. M. Pryor were held in the Christian church Tuesday afternoon; Rev. C. W. Reynolds of Corvallis, officiating. Burial was in the O. O. F. cemetery.

The death of Mr. Pryor occurred at his home here Sunday evening at 10:30 o'clock after an extended illness which had made him bedfast since last August. Mr. Pryor was born in Iowa where he lived for many years. He was a member of the Christian church and a member of the local Odd Fellow order for years. He was aged 68 years, nine months and 21 days. Besides his wife he is survived by his son Calvin, of Eugene and grandsons, Cliff and Gordon, and his foster-father, A. M. Grant, a veteran of the Civil war and a long time resident here.

Accident on Paving

The first accident of much consequence on the new stretch of paving between here and Halsey occurred just opposite Faulk station a little after 7 o'clock Sunday evening. W. J. Ellis and three other men of Seaside were on their way to Los Angeles and when they reached the point mentioned, the car's lights failed to work, hence the parking of the car near the extreme edge of the pavement. Nye Toby and F. E. McHenry, the former proprietor of a traveling concern known as Toby's Country Store and with his car laden with grocery goods for show advertising stunts, drove almost upon the parked car before they saw it, and swinging quickly to avoid a large car coming swiftly from the south, the front wheel hubs of the Ellis and Nye cars contacted and the Nye car peeled over into the deep roadside ditch, grooving goods were badly scattered and broken. To add to misfortune, the breaking of the lead pipe leaked gasoline and a fire soon resulted. The six men of the two cars succeeded in slinging sufficient of the wet mud handy in the ditch bottom to conquer the blaze speedily. A garage man from taking the attack and the damaged cars towed in for repairs and settlement of damages.
