MANNING ASKS FOR SUSPENSION FIGHT

New York, Dec. 21.—A Christmas truce in the dispute between fundamentalists and modernists which has been rending the Protestant Episcopal church appeared probable today.

Bishop William T. Manning of the diocese of New York, in a pastoral letter to 281 rectors in the diocese, urged discussion be suspended during the Christmas season, but showed no weakening in his firm stand for belief in the fundamental doctrines of the church, including the virgin birth of Christ. At the same time, however, fuel was added to the flames of doctrinal controversy by a debate between Dr. Charles Francis Potter of the West Side Unitarian church and Dr. John Roach Straton of Calvary Baptist church.

Doctor Potter, supporting the modernist cause, was awarded a decision by the judges.

CHEROKEE WINS IN BOUT FROM TACOMAN

Tacoma, Dec. 21.—Marty Foley, local heavyweight, spent most of his time in his shell here last night in battling George Lamson, Cherokee heavyweight, and Lamson copped the six round decision. Foley was tough, absorbing everything Lamson threw his way. In the last round Foley caught Lamson with a wild swing and George went down for a no count. He was up but groggy. Foley was too weary to land another hard blow. The bout was sensational especially Foley's last round spurt.

Hank Ryker subbed for Billy Conley and lost a six round decision to Truman Davis, Everett middleweight. Bobby Allen and Stanley Willis fought a four round draw.

Charles G. Dawes Head Of Allied Expert Commission

Paris, Dec. 21.—The reparations commission decided today to request Charles G. Dawes, former director of the United States budget to act as president of the committee of experts which will investigate Germany's finances.

JUSTICE COHOLAN MAY RETIRE
New York, Dec. 21.—The Brooklyn Standard-Union publishes a report that Supreme Court Justice Daniel Coholan is planning to retire from the bench in the near future.

The newspaper says Justice Coholan may direct a campaign to obtain the democratic presidential nomination for United States Senator James A. Reed of Missouri. No confirmation of the report could be obtained from Justice Coholan.

ALIENS GET CHRISTMAS GIFTS
Philadelphia, Dec. 21.—The United States government handed out Christmas presents to more than six hundred aliens in United States district court here today in the form of final citizenship papers. Every nationality was represented in the vast group of petitioners, excepting Japanese, Chinese and East Indians.

BASIC LUMBER PRICE IS NOW NEAR BOTTOM

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 21.—While basic prices and quotations from mills direct or to shippers are apparently at bottom there has been no reaction this week on a showing for new export business. Large squares, at no time affected by the weakness of baby squares, continue in demand although not for cargo lots. The volume of unsold baby squares cut during the unwarranted rush by mill mills into the cargo trade, on the strength of the speculative atmosphere caused by the Japanese earthquake, is estimated at 5,000,000 feet.

These accumulations are not being moved although offered freely at \$31 to \$32 with some at \$30. This is \$2 under the market of September-October. Mediums are quoted at \$28 and large \$32, some shippers claiming they paid \$3 over this figure as late as last month.

Buyers Holding Off.
Japan is in a benighted mood. Resident Japanese agents for Nippon buyers are said to have checked full details of the state of supplies here with the result that buyers are watching but are not trading, and it is the idea of the cargo mills that the year will come to an end and the next take a fair start before conditions improve.

Japan Market Soft.
Japanese buyers generally are a dollar under the West Coast market today. It is conceded by large and small groups of export cargo mills that the Japanese market is soft. One of the territory an occasional offer bears out this sentiment. During the week, mills in the Tacoma district offered 200,000 feet of fir baby squares to be loaded f. a. s. during the first two weeks in March at \$23; 200,000 feet of hemlock babies at \$22 and 200,000 feet of medium at \$28. This, it is claimed, is \$2 under the current October market.

Merchantable clears have shared somewhat in the weakness of large timbers. Japanese buyers who were pegged down tight on irreversible letters of credit have been attempting to get cancellations, but the sellers have refused to consider the proposition.

Freights Uncertain.
The Japanese market hinges largely on the state of the freight markets. Little headway has been made this past week on getting steamship operators to bring down costs, but tramp steamers are quoting \$15 which is a clear dollar lower. A small group of large shippers, perhaps with too much optimism, is predicting that Oriental freights will drop another dollar before the end is reached. Conference lines have discussed dropping the agreed minimum to \$15 but so far as shippers are concerned this has not yet been done. Undoubtedly another dollar off freights would wipe out considerable of the bearishness in Japan and help to stimulate the inquiry.

Charters Switched.
There is said to be some switching of Oriental charters. These fixtures were made when the market was in its most speculative mood, a time when shippers were willing to pay almost any figure to get space. The owners of this space bought the lumber, but to this hour have not been able to dispose of it, and rather than risk demurrage and other penalties are taking their losses now. Wholesalers principally are affected. Many who were new in this line of business permitted Japanese buyers to make payment in yen, neglecting to add enough yen to equalize with the American gold standard, and the yen has been fluctuating.

Australia Light Buyer.
Australia wants a little "merch," but total sales for the week for that account were light. There has been some disappointment over the failure of the Antipoden market to rise. The West Coast of South America is a very favorable factor today in the Pacific trade, and the yen has been fluctuating.
