OREGON TO NAME GRID COACH SOON

Selection of a football coach for the University of Oregon will be made shortly after the holidays, almost certainly by the middle of January, according to Virgil Earl, athletic director at the university.

Twelve men are being considered, he says. Some of them, however, of positions they are now holding, do not want their names made public. The following, however, have sent in applications; it is known:

R. O. Courtright, coach at Nevada university, the school that held California to a nothing to nothing this year.

M. A. Pickering, former assistant to Williams at Minnesota.

J. H. Richards, head coach at University of Wisconsin for six years, who is now a Los Angeles resident. Richards has not coached this year.

C. W. P. Reynolds, coach at Bucknell. Norman C. Paine, assistant to Alonzo Stagg, University of Chicago.

Stanley Burdick, of North Dakota Agricultural college. Bortleske, a brother of the Whitman coach, formerly held down the football berth at Lincoln high school, Portland. His 1915 team at Lincoln defeated Washington high school of Portland, which claimed the northwest championship that year, in a tight game.

Johnston Will Not Play With U. S. Olympic Team

San Francisco, Dec. 21.—William M. Johnston, second national ranking tennis player, does not expect to be able to compete in the Olympic games as a member of the United States team, he said today.

"While I have not definitely decided the matter, or given much thought to it, it looks now as if I would not be able to compete," Johnston said. "However, I have not refused as yet. I doubt if anything much is being done about the team as yet and don't think much will be done until spring. By that time things may have changed."

"Pressure of business affairs, which would be disrupted by a long trip, is given as the cause of his probable inability to play."

Oregon Asked To Play Baseball In Orient

Graduate Manager Banfield has received an offer from Meiji University of Japan for the University of Oregon to play baseball in the Orient. The Meiji team, one of the strongest college nines in Japan, is planning a tour of the United States, and desires to sponsor a trip of some Pacific coast university team to Japan.

Paris, Dec. 21.—Relieved of the dread of poverty by a pension voted her by the French chamber of deputies, Mme. Curie who, with her husband, discovered radium, intends to continue her scientific experiments and writings.

On the occasion of the 25th anniversary of the Curie discovery, the chamber granted Mme. Curie and her children an annual pension of 40,000 francs.

New Bridge Will Link Mexico To Guatemala

Mexico City, Dec. 21.—The Mexican government announces that the federal authorities of the Republic of Guatemala have agreed to the construction of a mammoth international bridge over the Nuchiate river, the southern boundary of Mexico. The structure will be erected jointly by both governments and will cost in the neighborhood of \$7,000,000. It will be built of reinforced concrete.

NEW TOURIST CAMP PLANNED FOR CITY

Eugene is to have a new auto tourist camp, according to the announcement today of William and Lester Wells, who will start building operations at once for the new camp.

Thirty cottages are to be erected on the grounds, which are located on Blair boulevard, just north of the Southern Pacific railroad tracks. A building permit was obtained this morning for the construction of six of the cottages within the city limits. The estimated cost for the six is \$300.

The remaining 24 cottages will be just outside the city limits, according to Wells. The camp will also host a service station.

The site of the new camp is in an old orchard and grove. The cottages will take the place of tents for sleeping quarters, and it is planned to make the camp one of the best equipped in this part of the country.

FOUR MORE YOUTHS ARRESTED FOR PART IN ROBBERY CASES

Much of the stuff stolen from houses and stores in and near Springfield was not when the barn on Ray Bryan's place burned several weeks ago. This 17-year-old lad is really the brains of the gang, according to officers today. He had a great quantity under his control in the barn, but lost it all when his father, climbing a ladder from the loft, slipped

ped on a rung and dropped a lantern that threw the building into flames.
That the boys had plans for "bigger things" in the way of safebreaking, hold-ups or bank robbery, was revealed by young Hazlette McKelvey. "We were doing all this small stuff to get experience," he told one of the officers. "After we were well posted we were going to do real big jobs." Officers say they found confirmation of this when they located three sticks of dynamite in Steve Edwards' bedroom closet.
Harlow Identifies Property.
Elmer Harlow, Willamette rancher, was the first to make his appearance and identify the stolen goods this morning. He said that everything stolen from his place had been recovered this morning

except a watch.
G. G. Bushman, manager of the Springfield Mill and Lumber company, identified his city of Warsaw bonds and Shell gas books, but was unable to get his corporation stock certificates, as these had burned in the Bryan barn. Bushman received some of the loot last week through the mail. The mother of one of the boys found the stuff around the house, questioned her son, and when she found where it had come from, returned it anonymously.
Search for More Articles
Goods of all kinds are included in the matter so far recovered. The lads seemed to steal anything they could get their hands on. A collection of mounted butterflies that had caught their eye in

some building was found this morning. A baby's jacket, useless to any of them but made of good materials in fine style, was also recovered.

ILLINOIS TO GIVE PARDON TO KELLER

Denver, Colo., Dec. 21.—Daddy is coming back with Santa Claus.
It was the unannounced question of five days that Mrs. John Keller gave her four small children today.
"Daddy" was arrested on information given by his wife in a fit of anger that he was an escaped convict from Joliet, Ill., penitentiary. Since then efforts of leading citizens have been made to obtain for him a parole or pardon because of his unblemished ten-year record in civil life since the escape.
Information was received here today from John L. Whitman, warden of the penitentiary at Joliet, that Keller will be returned to his family before Christmas, in possession of a pardon, if no objections are entered by Denver police.
R. H. Williams, chief of Denver police, replied that inasmuch as no charges have been entered against Keller here, the release would be welcomed.
A reply is expected here soon that charges against Keller have been dropped.
