## CALIFORNIA TOWN EXPELS KLANSMEN

Monterey, Cal., Dec. 21.—"Watchful waiting" was the attitude of Monterey authorities and citizenry today following the expulsion from the city last night of two men who professed to be organizers for the Ku Klux Klan.

Both men, who gave the names of George A. Paterbaugh and H. E. Palmer, avowed they would return with help, "legal and otherwise."

The men were arrested late yesterday when they entered the city and announced their plan to form a chapter of the Klan.

Chief of Police Cording, acting under orders from the police commissioner, immediately arrested both men on charges of vagrancy and ordered them to leave town. Last night they were escorted to the city limits and told not to return.

"Monterey is too small for the Klan," Cording told the men.

**Men Threaten Town.**  
 "We'll come back with help and you may pay for the way you've treated us," the men threatened.

"Come ahead," invited Cording. "There are plenty of people here who don't want you and we won't have you."

In arresting Paterbaugh, Chief Cording tore from the alleged klanman's vest a lodge pin.

"I'm a member of that fraternity," the chief declared. "You can't be a klanman and be a member and you have no other credentials than that pin."

Neither of the two men were able to furnish 50 bail but wired to the office of the state klan, who wired them the funds, according to Cording.

## FIRE DAMAGES HOME BLUE LAW ADVOCATE

Hollywood, Cal., Dec. 21.—Fire of incendiary origin late last night destroyed the garage and damaged the residence of Dr. Gustav Briegleb, staunch "blue law" advocate. It was revealed today.

The blaze followed shortly after receipt of Dr. Briegleb of a notice ordering him to leave the city under penalty of being tarred and feathered.

The minister was gone from his residence for a short time last night and during his absence neighbors discovered the garage ablaze and the flames spreading to the house. The damage will be several hundred dollars, it was estimated.

Fire department officials announced the fire was of incendiary origin. Dr. Briegleb has been one of the most ardent advocates of blue laws during the present fight over law enforcement now going on in Los Angeles. He is also personal friend of the Rev. Bob Shuler, another leader of the "blue law" forces.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 21.—The Valley Siletz railroad in Oregon applied today to the interstate commerce commission for authority to construct a one-mile extension to connect its line with the Southern Pacific at a point near Independence, Ore.

 Salem, Dec. 21.—The West Side highway is now open for travel between McMinnville and Corvallis, according to announcement by the state highway department here today. The pavement has been completed on this highway with the exception of a four-mile section between Monmouth and the Luckanum river and a one-half mile section between Suvor crossroad and the Soap creek bridge in Polk county. Both of these gaps are graveled and will carry light travel, but trucks are barred.
