WOMAN DIES WHEN SHE TRIES TO LEAP FROM COASTER CAR

Beach, Cal., Dec. 21.—A sailor is said to have killed 16 other persons injured, as the result of an accident here late last night in a roller coaster car on "The Pike" amusement and an ambulance, hurrying to the hospital, struck an

Belmont, sailor on the U. S. S. "Albatross" was killed when he attempted to jump from one fast moving car to another running parallel on the roller coaster track. He fell 90 feet to the beach with practically every bone in his body broken.

Details Second Car. The driver detailed the second car which was into a post, injuring 14 occupants. The carrier miraculously remained on its wheels, and did not plunge into the water below. Mrs. Catherine McDonald, 48, was perhaps fatally injured in an ambulance, speeding to the hospital. She was injured in the coast-guard car which struck the McDonald machine. Her husband, suffered a fracture but will perhaps recover.
