Klamath Slaying Is Clothed In Mystery

Klamath Falls, Jan. 21.—Who killed J. H. Bratton, well known resident of this city, prominent in fraternal circles, who was shot to death in his home early on Saturday morning, is the question which today is causing wide discussion here following the verdict late Saturday night that death was caused by a gunshot wound inflicted by a person unknown.

Bratton's death promises to go down in local history as an unsolved mystery, unless subsequent arrests bear out the testimony of Mrs. Bratton that the fatal shot was fired by a masked intruder, who also fired at her before vanishing into the night.

With perfect composure, Mrs. Bratton at the inquest told of incidents surrounding the death of her husband, her story varying not the slightest degree from that told the authorities previously. She was awakened by a shot, she said, turned on the light in her bedroom and opened the door into the dining room adjoining, where Bratton slept. As she did so a man, clad in a dark suit, wearing a low pulled cap and with the lower portion of his face covered, fired at her, then opened the door to the side porch, and disappeared.

Her cry aroused her son and a neighbor, who slept upstairs, but before they reached the room she had arranged the body of her husband, sprawled on his couch, and covered his face with a towel. She then called a doctor and the police.

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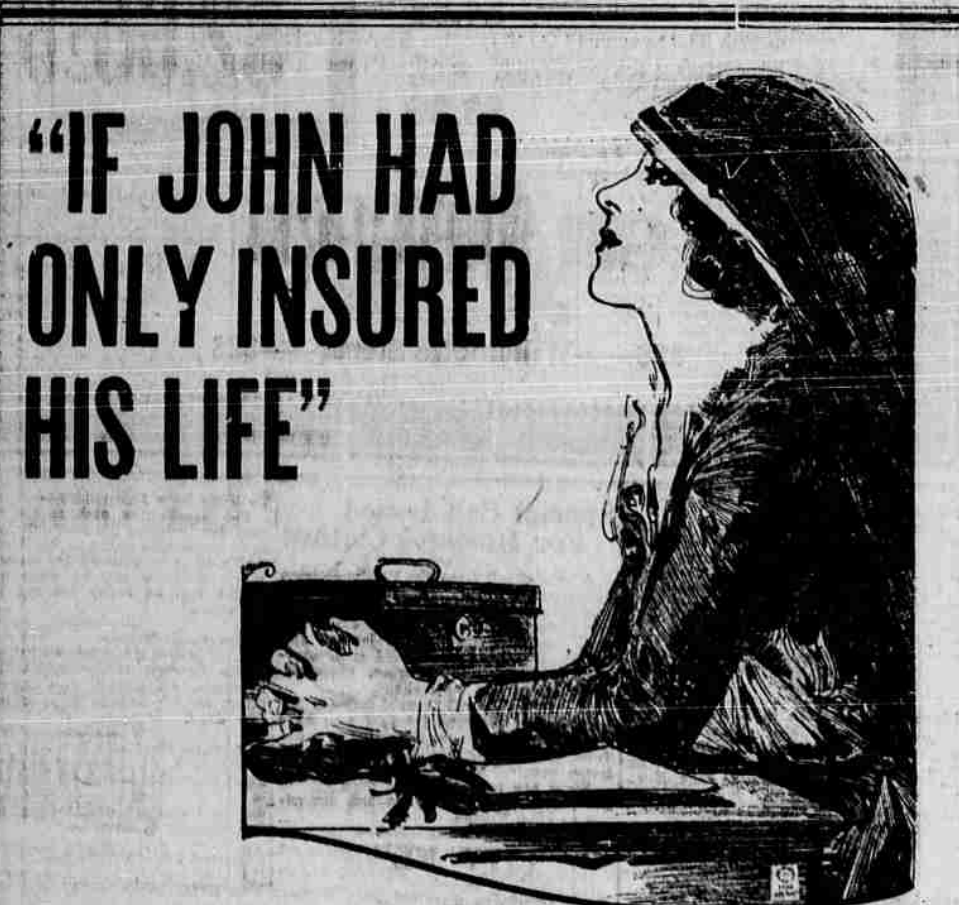

Railroad Will Buy Large Bill Of Lumber

Although there has been a temporary slump in the lumber market E. B. Duffy, Oregon representative of the Denver & Rio Grande, expects it to come back before long. Mr. Duffy's company has planned to purchase about two and one-half million dollars' worth of lumber in Oregon this year. In this are included 800,000 ties besides a lot of dimension stuff. Other railroads are expected to be heavy buyers again this year. Mr. Duffy expects to place a considerable portion of the contracts with mills in this section.—Marshfield Times.
