INTERNATIONAL PROMINENCE IS GIVEN THIS CITY

Eugene Man Becomes Head of Oregon Sportsmen; Fly Casting and Sport Shoot Tournaments Coming Here.

Eugene leaped into international sport world prominence at Portland last week. The results of her leap mean this:

1.—E. C. Simmons of Eugene is president of the Oregon State Sportsmen's association.

2.—The international field events, held in Chicago last year, will be staged in Eugene in September.

3.—The national fly casting and bait casting tournaments will be held here during the same week.

4.—The Oregon State Sportsmen's association convention will be held in this city while the other big events are going on.

5.—The annual Pacific coast blue rock shoot will be held here as another attraction of the week in September.

6.—And in addition the annual Pacific coast handicap trapshoot will in all probability last the longest.

Nation's Best Coming. The field events will give Eugeneans a change to see the best dogs in the United States and Canada working Canada has pledged from 12 to 15 of her best, and others will come from all parts of the United States...

Evidence that entries would be made from all sections of the country was given at the convention held in Portland this week, when dog fanciers far and near pledged their support to the international meet here.

The field events will be run off in the swales west of the city, according to present plans of the Lane County Sportsmen's association.

Senate Opposes Daugherty

The senate, overwhelmingly opposed to the attorney-general, was moving toward enactment of the Wheeler resolution, authorizing an investigation of Daugherty's record. It was predicted in senate chambers that the resolution would be enacted tonight.

Convinced meanwhile that the president would not weaken in his determination to give Daugherty a fair chance to vindicate himself, republican party leaders turned their guns directly upon the attorney-general. He pleads that he voluntarily resigns "for the good of the party" and as a means of quieting democratic attacks, the attorney-general turned a deaf ear.

The attorney-general's defiance of his colleagues aroused over disclosures.

COLLEAGUES AROUSED OVER DISCLOSURES

Washington, Feb. 21.—To the charges already made against Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty in connection with his administration of the department of justice was added the further charge today that he had dealt in Sinclair oil stock through a New York brokerage house.

The information on which these new charges are based has already been made before President Coolidge, it was said this afternoon by Senator Wheeler of Montana, who is leading the fight to oust the attorney-general from the cabinet.

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It is understood that the special investigators rendered a report to two democratic senators, Walsh and Wheeler, of the evidence they found on the brokerage books, and were instructed to reduce this report to writing, which was done. In accordance with this new senatorial evidence, the democratic senators called on republicans and it was decided that this condition should be met with the president. This was done Sunday night.

SWORD HANGS OVER HEAD

Washington Feb. 21.—A sword of Damocles with the thread in the hand of President Coolidge, dangled today over the head of Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty.

Tremendous pressure was being exerted on the president from every side—in the name of party expediency—to save the string by demanding Daugherty's resignation in the face of charges of malfeasance in office. Against the advice of republican leaders, senate spokesmen and his personal advisers, the president was apparently holding firm to a promise that the attorney general will remain in the cabinet until he has had a fair trial on the charges leveled at his conduct of the department of justice.

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DAUGHERTY STRIKES BACK AT HIS FOES

Washington, Feb. 21.—Striking resolutely at his opponents, Attorney General Daugherty, whose resignation has been demanded in the senate because of his alleged connection with the Teapot Dome oil lease, this afternoon wrote a letter to Senator George Wharton Pepper, republican of Pennsylvania, demanding a "fair trial" on the charges made against him.

Daugherty's letter was in reply to one written him by Pepper.

Referring to Pepper's statement that he (Daugherty) was "on the wrong side of an issue in the minds of the public," the attorney general said:

"I assume you have in mind the resolution of Senator Wheeler and his speech on the floor of the senate. You have then concluded that I am on the wrong side of an issue, without evidence, on my own side of an issue, without hearing, without evidence, and accepted as final the unseemly, scandalous and defamatory charges of my political adversaries."

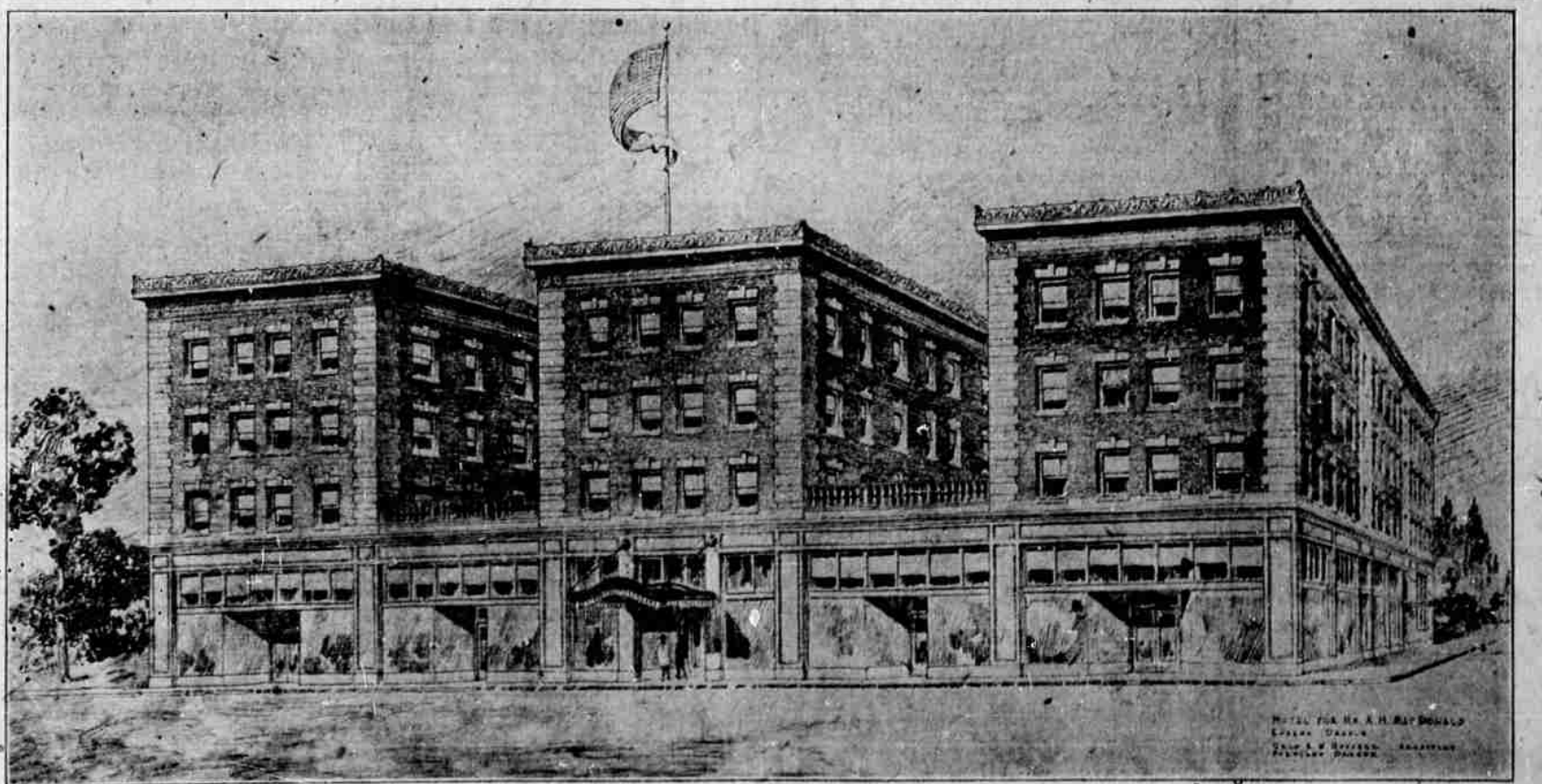
"My elimination, voluntarily or otherwise, will be a confession of the truth of all the baseless charges of our adversaries and will justify them."
