LAND TO BE CRUISED BY NEASE SELECTED BY COMMISSIONERS

One hundred acres of land listed as timberland on the tax rolls have been designated by the two Lane commissioners, Emmett Sharp and L. N. Roney, as land to be cruised by M. G. Nease of Portland under the terms of the contract that taxpayers at their meeting February 6, demanded the county court rescind.

Barnard Does Not Sign.
This land is located northeast and southwest of Eugene and southeast of Cottage Grove. Some of it is located on the headwaters of the Mohawk and north of the McKenzie, more of it is situated on the upper Siuslaw and still more on Mosby Creek and tributaries, southeast of Cottage Grove.

County Judge Barnard did not sign the order, not being in favor of the price Nease has contracted for.

The cruise contractor says he has already engaged a number of packers, and that he expects to establish a number of camps soon. He has not decided which locality to work first.

Following are the timber tracts designated for the cruise:

MRS. DICKINSON DIES AT HOME NEAR HERE

Mrs. Rosetta Dickinson, 60, died at her home on the River road north of the city Wednesday afternoon. She is survived by one son, D. D. Dickinson, with whom she made her home; two sisters, Mrs. W. R. Hollenbeck of Willowbrook, Cal., and Mrs. O. E. Callison of San Jose, Cal., and one brother, Merritt Davis of Salem.

Mrs. Dickinson was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lycurus Davis who crossed the plains with ox teams in the pioneer days. She was born on a farm near Junction City, and had lived in Lane county all her life. She was a member of the Christian church.

Funeral services will be held at the Veach chapel Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. E. V. Silvers of the First Christian church officiating. Burial will be in the Masonic cemetery.

FAMILY ROW LEADS TO KILLINGS AND SLAYER SUICIDES

Danville, Ill., Feb. 21.—A girl's charges regarding the paternity of her unborn child led an irate father to slay her and all members of her family and seal the tragedy within an isolated farm house at Philo until the accused son stumbled over the bodies nearly 24 hours later.

This was the theory developed by police today in their investigation of the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Whistle, and their daughter, Edna, 17, and the suicide of Louis Kuntz, butcher of Homer, and brother of Mrs. Whistle.

The slayer, police believe, was Louis Kuntz.

His victims were his brother-in-law; his sister and his niece.

The killings are believed to have followed a family argument over the division of some property.

Police Reconstruct Crime.

As police endeavored to reconstruct the crime from evidence left in the Whistle home, where all witnesses lay dead, the early theory that an argument over the division of property had prompted the killings was gradually abandoned.

The charges against Russell Kuntz, the son, police learned, were to have been heard in a Philo court tomorrow.

Kuntz arrived at the Whistle home early Tuesday morning and went directly to a barn. There he shot and killed Mr. Whistle as he was milking. He then went to the house and killed Mrs. Whistle, as she lay in bed.

Miss Whistle was in bed when the shooting occurred and, aroused by the shots had started to dress to come down stairs while she was still only partially robed, Kuntz broke into her room, denounced her for her charges, knocking her to the floor and shot her as she lay at his feet. Her body is the only one which shows marks of an attack.

Charge Tex Rickard With Scalping Aid

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 21.—Charges made by Tom O'Rourke, before the ways and means committee on the Lord bill at Albany, N. Y., yesterday, that Tex Rickard was in with the scalpers, were backed up here today by Gene Doyle, who was associated with Jess Willard when he made his comeback.

"I saw the contract that Rickard submitted to Willard for a return bout with Jack Dempsey and it called for a guarantee of \$500,000 in cash, a percentage of the gate over \$400,000, an interest in the pictures and a percentage of the scalpers' profits," said Doyle.

"I asked Willard what that clause was about where it mentioned a percentage of the scalpers' profits and he stated that he was wise to the way they did business in New York and he was going to get all that was coming to him and that Rickard turned over thousands of seats to scalpers to beat the law governing the prices of the fight tickets."

"Willard asked me to change a clause in the contract that called for \$25,000 traveling expenses to \$5,000 which I did and I signed the contract as a witness, but Willard never sent the contract back as he wasn't satisfied with the time they had given him to train for the bout or the date set for the encounter."

Famous Violinist Is Coming Next Tuesday

Tuesday evening, February 26, at 8 o'clock, has been set as the date Renee Chemet, world famous violinist, will appear in concert before music lovers of Eugene. Because of a large number of students and townspeople are expected to attend the musicale, the large auditorium in the Methodist church has been selected as a suitable place to present the artist under the auspices of the Associated Students of the University.

Tuesday evening Eugene people will hear for the first time the golden-toned Guadagnini violin, which Mme. Chemet has been given the use of since the death of its former mistress, Maud Powell.

This instrument is considered one of the most perfectly toned violins in the world and is the product of an old master. Speaking of Mme. Chemet the New York Globe says: "One of the most fascinating drawers of the bow in the entire world. Not in my time (Pitts Sanborn critic) has this music been played here so captivatingly." The Philadelphia North American says: "She is a thoroughly individual artist, and brings to her performance those true virtuoso characteristics of dazzling technique, temperamental flexibility and spiritual perception."

Presbyterians Have Pastorate Plan Ready

The new home for Rev. Bruce Giffen, Presbyterian pastor of the University of Oregon, will be built this spring, officials of the church have announced. The state Presbyterian church will finance the project.

The home will be built on the site at Fourteenth avenue east and Kincaid street, recently purchased by the church. The home will be on one end of the site, and within the next few years a new theology building will be placed on the remainder at a cost of approximately \$50,000, according to the plans.

Two Policemen Shot In L. A. Two-Bank Robbery

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 21.—Two police officers and a citizen were shot, one perhaps fatally, as two bandit gangs swooped down on two branch banks in different parts of the city shortly before noon today.

The banks were the Merchants National Branch bank and the Security Trust and Savings Branch bank. The bandits obtained more than \$50 in cash.

DRY OFFICERS HELD

Gold Beach, Feb. 21.—State Prohibition Officers Paul Mumpower and E. A. Neal were arrested Tuesday afternoon in Coquille by Sheriff Ellingson of Coos county at the request of Sheriff Huntley, charged with first degree murder in connection with the death of Lawrence Hare, near Brookings last Thursday. Sheriff Huntley will go to Coquille, Wednesday, to get the men and bring them to Gold Beach for a preliminary hearing before County Judge Wood.

Upon evidence furnished by M. Lawrence of Pistol River, uncle of Hale, County Judge W. A. Wood this morning issued a warrant for the arrest of Mumpower and Neal on a charge of first degree murder.

SEATTLE FIRE MYSTERY

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 21.—Mysteriously assaulted and seriously burned by a fire which completely destroyed his home at Seattle heights, near here today, Joshua Munner, aged 40, is unconscious and near death in a local hospital. His skull is fractured as though from an axe blow.

MRS. ALLEN'S recipe for DOUGHNUTS

- 1 cupful sugar
- 2 eggs and 1 egg yolk
- 1 cupful milk
- 2 tablespoonfuls Snowdrift
- 1 teaspoonful Cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoonful Clove
- 1 1/2 teaspoonfuls salt
- 2 teaspoonfuls baking powder
- From 4 to 5 cupfuls flour

Beat the eggs, then cream in the sugar and add the milk. Sift together the dry ingredients, using four cupfuls of flour. Add the melted Snowdrift to the first mixture, beat in the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Put a fourth of the mixture at a time onto a slightly floured board, roll over the dough, to coat it with flour, then roll it out to one-fourth inch in thickness and shape with a doughnut-cutter. Conscrip All Wealth In War, Capper Plan

Washington, Feb. 20.—Conscription of the nation's entire wealth and man power for service in time of war was proposed in a bill offered in the senate this afternoon by Senator Capper, republican of Kansas. The bill had the endorsement of the American Legion and is said to embody the views of the late President Harding.

The measure is designed to prevent exploitation and profiteering in time of war.
