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Governor Al Smith Becomes Dry Leader

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 21.—"The thing to do is to enforce it (the Volstead act) and do this irrespective of what may be the public opinion of any locality as to the wisdom or otherwise of such an act."

These words came almost four months to the day before the convening in New York of a democratic national convention that may be controlled by delegates from southern and western states. They came also almost eight months to the day after west interests throughout the country hilariously hailed Governor Smith's action in signing the Mullan-Gage law repealer.

Tonight no doubt remains that Governor Smith is an active candidate for the presidential nomination of his party. Political observers see in his speech tonight an attempt to counteract wide belief that he is a "wet."

COOLIDGE PUZZLED IN CHOOSING MAN TO SUCCEED DENBY

Washington, Feb. 20.—The task of mending the first break in his cabinet is before President Coolidge today.

Less than 24 hours after the announcement of the resignation of Edwin Denby, secretary of the navy, more than a half dozen names were before the executive for consideration. Within another 24 hours, that many more will have been placed at his disposal.

President Handicapped.
In selecting the successor to his navy chief—the first of his official family to give way before the odium of the great oil scandal—President Coolidge is handicapped by several important factors. Foremost of these is the impending presidential campaign and the resultant need of making an appointment that will be politically wise. Second, is the fact that certain of the men who would be given the most favorable consideration come from states which already boast of a member in the cabinet, while others are not inclined to accept the honor for one reason or another.

Among those most prominently mentioned for the post are former Congressman Patrick H. Kelly of Lansing, Mich., ex-Senator Miles Polidexter of Washington, present ambassador to Peru and Charles Fletcher Warren of Detroit, former ambassador to Japan and member of the committee that negotiated recognition of Mexico last summer.

Kelly Looks Best.
Of the three, Kelly at this time is believed to stand the best show. Coming from the same state as Denby, he carries the additional benefit of having been a ranking member of the house naval affairs committee at one time and chairman of the appropriation committee's sub-committee in charge of naval appropriations. He is also political power in Michigan.

Other names presented to the president for consideration include Senator George Wharton Pepper of Pennsylvania, Senator Frederick Hale of Maine and Representative Burton L. French of Idaho.

Definite selection and announcement of the successor to Denby is not expected much before March 10, the date of Denby's retirement.

STOCK PROFITS WILL BE TAXABLE, NEW TAX BILL PROVIDES

Washington, Feb. 21.—The profits from stock dividends will be made taxable as other income under an amendment written into the new revenue bill today by the house. The amendment was proposed by Representative Garner, democrat of Texas, and was adopted by a vote of 162 to 112.

The amendment provided that stock dividends shall bear the regular income tax rates and be taxed in the hands of the holder or of the corporation that declares the dividend.
