**Leaves for Portland**—R. T. Burghardt, manager of the Eugene Foundry and Machine company of Eugene, drove to Portland this morning on a business trip. He plans to return here Saturday.

**Goes to Bellingham**—William Lee, who has been employed in Brier and Peterson's sample store here for the past two years, has been transferred to Bellingham, Wash., where he will take charge of the company's store.

**Motorcycle Key Located**—The key to Elmer Peasby's motorcycle, stolen last week, has been found on the Lang & Company roof. The motorcycle, minus its cylinder, was found Tuesday across the river, but the key was still missing. Someone had evidently thrown it away, and it landed on the roof.

**Transients Reported**—Three transients who were taken to the city jail Wednesday night got chilly at 4 o'clock in the morning, according to the police. 
