### DEAN ALLEN TELLS OF CITY PLANNING ACROSS ATLANTIC

Comparisons between city building in Europe and America, to the advantage of both sections of the globe, were drawn by Eric W. Allen, dean of the University of Oregon school of journalism who has just returned from an extended trip to the continent, at the regular Thursday luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce.

Dean Allen went into great detail regarding city planning from Caesar's time, and presented many facts, old but rarely known to the average American business man, on how Europe progressed in community growth. He led his hearers from century to century, outlining the needs of the times from year to year and how city fathers of old met their problems.

The French, he found, were as enterprising as Americans, tearing down to make room for improvements deemed necessary, and sacrificing many structures rich with historic sentiment, if need be, to accomplish their aims.

### HALF OF BUDGET IS RAISED IN V DRIVE

Y. M. C. A. canvassers today reported a total of \$7,944. The executive committee bringing in \$2,730 of this. Team A under the leadership of L. J. Temple has a lead of \$203 on team B managed by C. A. McClain. Dr. Hutchins encouraged workers in a short talk during the luncheon.

Beginning Saturday noon, the town will be divided into districts and different teams of solicitors will take them in.

COSHOW WANTS JUDGESHIP Salem, Ore., Feb. 21.—(I. N. S.)—O. P. Coshow, of Roseburg Wednesday filed his declaration as a candidate for the democratic nomination for judgeship of the supreme court. Justice Coshow was recently appointed to the bench by Governor Pierce, succeeding Justice Lawrence T. Harris, resigned.

### INTERNATIONAL PROMINENCE IS GIVEN THIS CITY

Some place on the McKenzie river will be chosen as the scene of the fly and bait casting tournament. The Pacific coast blue rock shoot will bring 150 or more of the best shots of the entire west into action at the state game farm. The blue rock shoot is one of the scatergun classics of the west.

Within a few days word will be received concerning the Pacific coast handicap shoot, which will in all probability be held here during the same week. This is the other big shoot of the west, and would bring an "enormous" delegation of sports artists to this city.

Convention Big Affair. The called convention of the Oregon State Sportsmen's association will be held here during the same week that the other sporting activities are going on. For several years the convention has been held in Eugene, and the anglers' club in the state, has been meeting in Portland, and Eugene holds the distinction of getting the best convention held outside of the northern city.

E. C. Simmons of Eugene, who was elected president of the association Tuesday, will preside at the convention here. There will be between 400 and 500 visitors in Eugene for the big sporting events in September, according to the estimates. It is expected to have all the events the same week.

During September. The exact dates for the busy week have not been decided, but it is certain that September will be the month. The sportsmen here will desire into the dates available to avoid conflict with other activities of the city and county during the month, and the date for the sporting week will be announced then.

The sports will last for at least five days, and it is possible that the visitors will be entertained at a huge barbecue at the McKenzie fish hatchery on the final evening.

While they are here the visitors will be taken through the McKenzie hatchery, which is one of the largest in the United States, and through the state game farm, which is reputed to be the largest in the world.

Wallace Given Credit. The international national coast and state events were billed for Eugene at the meeting of the Oregon State Sportsmen's association held in Portland last week. W. R. Wallace, Lane county delegate to the meeting, was given credit today for bringing the events here. E. C. Simmons, who also attended the session from Lane, was named president of the association. He succeeds Judge Thomas of Medford in the office. Clyde McKay was re-elected vice-president and H. J. Kirkwood secretary-treasurer. Every county in the state was represented at the sessions.

Governor Pierce was urged to take immediate steps against possible extermination of beaver in a resolution unanimously adopted. He was asked to revoke all permits for killing of beaver and sale of their skins.

### COLLEAGUES AROUSED OVER DAUGHERTY ACT

Senator Wheeler, who sponsored the proposed investigation, announced this morning he would force a test vote upon his resolution during the day. Wheeler denounced Daugherty's reply to his charges. The attorney-general, he said, failed to make any reply to these charges:

- 1—The department of justice failed to produce any evidence in the oil lease scandals.
- 2—That Daugherty failed to prosecute E. L. Doherty, H. F. Sinclair, A. B. Fall or R. C. Forbes, all publicly accused of fraud and corruption.
- 3—That "influence" was purchased within the department of justice to nullify criminal prosecutions.

These are sufficient reasons for Daugherty's immediate resignation," Wheeler added. "In addition, I have further evidence in my possession now which will convince every fair minded person and the president himself that the attorney-general should no longer remain in the cabinet."

Before a vote can be reached on Wheeler's resolution, an argument must first be reached on his proposal to name an "insurgent" controlled investigating committee.

A compromise was being sought to have the committee members propose and vote upon directly from the floor of the senate.

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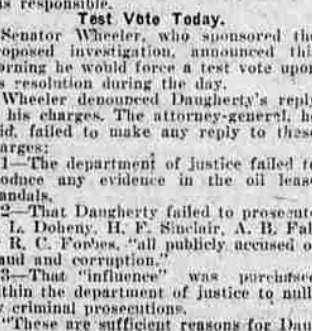
