ELINOR GLYN'S STORY OF "SIX DAYS" PLAYS AT REX

Elinor Glyn has written an unusual and most absorbing screen story in "Six Days," which is playing today only at the Rex. The characters are sympathetic and vividly portrayed; photography by John Meehan is everywhere satisfactory and in many instances touches the highest pictorial beauty.

Corinne Griffith heads the cast as Lillian Kingston, a young American girl engaged to Sir Charles Chetwyn, a wealthy Englishman. Frank Mayo is featured with Miss Griffith in the role of Dion Leslie, the lover.

They are imprisoned, along with a priest who acted as their guide, in a German dugout which collapses when a secret mine is exploded by touching a German land mine. THOMAS MEIGHAN STARRING IN "PIED PIPER MALONE," CASTLE

Booth Tarkington evinced a keen interest in the filming of his story, "Pied Piper Malone," written especially for Thomas Meighan, the star of the Paramount picture at the Castle today, Friday and Saturday. He was on the "set" during the filming of a greater part of the scene for the story.

Although several of Mr. Tarkington's novels have been put into picture form, this is the first one he has written originally for the screen and the first one he has actually had a working part in.

"Pied Piper Malone" is a tale of the New England shipping town of Oldport. It is a sailor's romance. Lots of Wilson is leading woman and others in the supporting cast are equally prominent. "THE FOOL ON POLLOCK'S DOORSTEP FOR TEN YEARS"

One of the most interesting bits of psychology in the theatre is that behind the assertion that it took Channing Pollock ten years to write "The Fool." In very plain English, this play is in existence because Mr. Pollock couldn't help it.

"You know, a play begins with an idea," says Mr. Pollock. "Well, the idea for 'The Fool' came to me ten years ago. I was sitting at my desk, and I was thinking of a play. I knew I wasn't ready to write it. Then, recurrently, as I finished one play and dug into my thought for another, the idea for 'The Fool' came back persistently. It was like Sidney Lanier's description of the 'little green leaves' which would not let him alone in his sleep. The idea embodied in this play would not let me alone even in my sleep."

"When I had finished 'Roads of Destiny,' the idea embodied in 'The Fool' was so active I could no longer deny it place and power. I discussed it with Shelley Hull. He was enthusiastic. But before I got down to transcribing it, Shelley Hull had left this world, and after that I was interested in a little. In fact, I believed I had entirely given up the idea of doing it, and went to work on 'The Sign on the Door.' As soon as that play was produced, 'The Fool' came back and sat on my mental doorstep. It will be shown at the Heilig in Eugene next Tuesday."

The Camels Are Coming

PERIOD OF USEFULNESS NOW STEADILY INCREASING

IT IS good thrift not only to make the most of one's time, but to stretch one's years of useful activity to the greatest possible span.

Undoubtedly the popular viewpoint on longevity is changing. The average man is not considered "through" at an early age as was the case two or three generations ago.

Most of the generals in the Civil War were under 45. In the World War the British generals averaged 53.9 years of age. The French average was 60.5 years.

The average age of those who sat at the Peace Conference in Paris in 1919 was 63.

One of New York's active financiers today was an adviser of Abraham Lincoln. A great and useful industrial leader in this country is midway between 70 and 80. An active and honored leader of organized labor is four years beyond the allotted three score and ten.

One of the most profound members of the legal profession in America is nearing 80. Our greatest inventor is several years beyond his 70th milestone. An active, forceful leader in educational thought is nearing ninety.

A New York newspaper recently gave the average age of its working staff as 47, with six members between 60 and 70 and three past 70. One was still doing his day's work at 79. Yet journalism is popularly considered a young man's profession.

One might travel every walk of life and find those at their places of duty who are beyond the Biblical limitation.

The recent death of President Wilson was universally regarded as untimely—the result of abnormal responsibilities during the War rather than the natural wearing out of the machine.

It is an inspiring thought that we are learning more and more to give a just appraisal to the values that come only from long experience. And as these valuations continue to find their rightful place the universal incentive to prolong one's years of useful activity is correspondingly stimulated.

Each year that can be added to the period of usefulness to one's self and to others increases the sum total of human happiness and accomplishment.

OREGON PROCLAIMS WARES IN CHICAGO

Chamber Points Out Advantages To Easterners

Chicago, March 15. — The state of Oregon has invaded Chicago through its state chamber of commerce to proclaim its wares and introduce the state to Chicago. The main reason for the invasion, which was held at the Hotel LaSalle, was to call the attention of the railroads to the outstanding advantages of the northwest for tourists. Moving pictures, souvenirs and talks were used to illustrate the point. A luncheon was served to the chamber of commerce and guests at noon, the entire menu being composed of Oregon products including "chick planked salmon."

Oregon's Wealth Estimated By Bureau Of Commerce

Washington, March 15. — The department of commerce announced for the state of Oregon its preliminary estimate of the value, December 31, 1922, of the principal forms of wealth, the total amounting to \$3,410,450,000, as compared with \$2,052,200,000 in 1912, an increase of 68.3 per cent. Per capita values increased from \$2,781 to \$4,182, or 50.4 per cent.

All classes of property increased in value from 1912 to 1922. The estimated value of taxed real property and improvements increased from \$1,062,782,000 to \$1,729,957,000, or 62.7 per cent; exempt real property (exclusive of Crater Lake National park) from \$100,812,000 to \$300,134,000, or 297.2 per cent; live stock from \$74,383,000 to \$74,176,000, or 1.1 per cent; farm implements and machinery from \$14,345,000 to \$31,242,000, or 117.8 per cent; manufacturing machinery, tools and implements from \$38,108,000 to \$83,451,000, or 119.3 per cent; and railroads and their equipment from \$250,002,000 to \$365,232,000, or 46.7 per cent. Privately owned transportation and transmission enterprises, other than railroads, increased in value from \$135,747,000 to \$184,070,000, or 35.7 per cent; and stocks of goods, vehicles other than motor, furniture, and clothing from \$302,941,000 to \$540,184,000, or 78.3 per cent. No comparison is possible for the value of motor vehicles, which was estimated in 1922 at \$50,373,000, because no separate estimate was made in 1912.

In making these estimates the department followed in general the methods employed in making the estimates for 1912, though it is believed that in some respects the work of 1922 has been more thorough. It should be borne in mind that the increase in value of property is a large extent due to the rise in prices which has taken place in recent years, and so far as that is the case they do not

represent corresponding increases in the quantity of wealth. The estimated values of gold and silver coin and bullion, the vessels of the navy, and privately owned waterworks will appear only in totals for the United States.

This afternoon a conference was attended by traffic managers and advertising managers of 22 of the principal railroads of the country.

Norfolk, Va., March 13.—Maritime authorities today awaited word from the Norwegian steamer Clay with ten survivors aboard from the Ward line freighter Santiago, that foundered in the Atlantic storm, with the probable loss of 25 men, sixty miles south of Cape Hatteras, early yesterday.

The Santiago, with a cargo of sugar, was enroute from Matanzas, Cuba, to New York, when it carried a crew of 35 men. The ten survivors were picked up in a life boat by the Clay.

S. F. OLYMPICS PRAISED
Kansas City, Mo., March 13.—Eight survivors of the national A. A. U. basketball tournament will play in the third round here tonight. The decisive defeat which the Olympics of San Francisco handed to the Leacocks of St. Louis yesterday gave the coast team considerable prestige here.
