FRUIT COMPANY'S BUILDING UNDERWAY

Work leading to the start of construction on the new 80 by 115 foot building to be erected by the Pacific Fruit and Produce company at Fourth and Commercial is now underway. Workmen are removing the old Jennings home off the lot in sections, preparatory to the erection of walls. The new building will be built of hollow concrete blocks, says J. C. Bullion, branch manager, and will be of one story with a railroad spur connection with the Southern Pacific lines, in the rear.

Grandstand and Sons, Portland contractors who do all the work for this company, have the contract. They are being material locally.

The most modern rooms for the storage of bananas, wet and dry vegetables will be provided. Provision will be made for shifting temperatures that the produce may be kept in the best condition possible.

It is expected that with good weather the place will be completed by June 1. The company has been quartered in Frank L. Chambers' building, 601 High since its establishment here.

PERMITS GIVEN FOR 5 NEW RESIDENCES

Building permits for the construction of four new homes in Eugene were issued this morning, and one was given late Thursday afternoon by W. H. Alexander, city building inspector. The total estimated cost of construction involved is \$15,500. In addition, one permit was issued for improvement of the cottage owned by A. J. McKays at 1604 Lawrence street, to cost \$200.

Hargreaves and Lindsay took out three of the four permits for new homes this morning. The contractors plan to build a residence at 1161 Jefferson street to cost \$3500, one at 1177 Jefferson street, to cost \$2500, and one at 1133 Jefferson street, to cost \$2500.

H. W. Melby took out a permit for George Marx, for the construction of a residence at 1709 Lawrence street, to cost \$3000, while C. E. Leabo obtained a permit for L. J. Jesson for the building of a residence at 491 Twelfth avenue, to cost \$4000.

The plan is to have receptacles in the sidewalks in which flag poles may be placed, which will occur as demands. In this manner a uniform display of the flags in the business district may be effected.

FLAG DISPLAY PLAN WORK UNDER WAY

Installation of receptacles for the uniform flag display system on holidays in Eugene is under way, and the workmen will continue their activities until the receptacles are all completed. This morning the location of the system was being completed and the first of the receptacles were being placed.

So far there have been 184 merchants who have adopted the plan for the uniform flag display, according to officials of the American Legion, in charge of the proposal.

EUGENE LEGION IS SECOND IN STATE

Lane County Post No. 3 of the American Legion is the second largest post in the state of Oregon, according to data received from the state department by George E. Love, post commander here. Portland post is the largest in the state.

The enrollment of the local post at the present time is 370.

The Eugene post has shown the greatest increase in membership this year; over last year of any post in the state, including Portland, the data shows. Last year there were 350 members, as compared with the 370 now.

A certificate of honor for the local Legionnaires is to be presented from the state department at the state convention in Portland in June, in recognition of the membership work.

CHICAGO 'SPRING' ARRIVES IN STORM

Chicago, March 21.—Spring rode in on a blizzard which continued to sift snow and absorbent gusty greetings today after laying a blanket of four inches over the midwest and Great Lakes territory today.

Unlike its winter predecessors which moved down from the Canadian north-west, the blustery season's finale came from the southwest, where Muskogee, Okla., reported 16 inches of snow.

Perforate north and east, it reminded Missouri, Indiana, Illinois and lower Michigan that coal supplies might yet call for re-inforcement. St. Louis receiving four inches of sticky snow and southern Illinois suffers a depth that blocked traffic.
