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**PORTLANDERS HEAR OF LANE RESOURCES AT CLUB LUNCHEON**

More than three hundred Portland business men, members of the Progressive Business Men's club of that city, heard of the wonders and resources of Lane county at their Thursday noon luncheon from a delegation of Eugene boosters.

This county cut more than 340,000,000 feet of lumber during 1923, a tremendous gain over the previous high record of 230,000,000 feet, said John M. Williams, who talked on lumbering.

Eugene-Chadwick, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, told of the industrial development here, and of Lane's natural resources that could be manufactured here into products that could be shipped to the wide world through Portland's harbor. Chadwick laid great stress on Lane's agricultural possibilities, and of the up-to-date spirit manifested among agriculturists.

Mayor Parks extended an invitation to the Portland club, on behalf of the Eugene chamber, to visit this city and put on a program at some Thursday noon luncheon. This was promised for some time in May.

Prospects for the growth of Eugene were dwelt upon by Judge G. F. Skippworth of the Lane circuit bench, who confided to the luncheon attendees his belief that this city would be of 50,000 population within a few years.

Admiring the people of Oregon to quit apologizing for the rain that makes this an emerald state the year around, Frank Jenkins, editor of the Morning Register, drew strong applause when he declared that it was an asset worth the widest advertising.

An invitation to Portland sportsmen to take advantage of fish and game opportunities in this county was extended by Donald Young.

Warm appreciation greeted the musical novelty presented by Mrs. Donald Young, Mrs. Rose Stacks and Mrs. Alfred Morgan.

**Government Would Recover Cash As Result Fake Entry**

Portland, Ore., March 21.—(U. S. S.) United States Attorney John S. Rogers started suit against W. R. Woodard of LaGrande and a group of Wisconsin citizens to recover \$100,000 alleged to have been fraudulently obtained through the use of dummy entries on 8,000 acres of timber land in Union and Baker counties.

The government alleges by use of dummy entries land purchased from the government under the timber and stone land entry law in 1902 at \$2.50 an acre was sold five years later at \$9 an acre. According to the complaint the land was transferred soon after title was acquired to the Oregon Lumber and Mining company of which T. F. Macmillan of Iron River, Wis., was president and Frank S. Herbert, secretary. This corporation sold the property to Edwin Wislock of the Catherine Creek Lumber company, president owners.

**Government Liable For Tax Refund, Is Daugherty Decision**

Washington, March 21.—Paying the way for probable suits against the government for refund on inheritance taxes in California, an important tax decision was sent to the treasury department Thursday by Attorney General Daugherty.

Under a decision rendered three years ago by the department of justice certain community property belonging to the husband and going to the widow at his death could be taxed.

The new decision revokes the old and holds that "the federal government can impose no inheritance tax on that portion of the community estate which passes to the wife on the death of the husband."

It was stated, owing to state laws, the decision is only applicable to California.

**Bond Duplication Is Up For Probe, Report**

Washington, March 21.—Another congressional investigation—into the reports of bond duplication in the government printing office—became imminent today when the house rules committee favorably reported a resolution for such an inquiry, by a committee of five members of the house.

Plymouth, Eng., March 21.—Lieutenant Ralph Davidson, U. S. N., who will attempt to fly across the Arctic circle with Hoot Amundsen, the Polar explorer, arrived today enroute for Pisa, Italy to inspect the planes for the flight which have been constructed there.

**BANISH SPANISH OFFICER**

Madrid, March 21.—General Primo Rivera, head of the directory, announced today that no attention will be paid to foreign protests against the banishment of Professor Unalun, famous Spanish intellectual, because of his anti-government statement.

**ANGLO-FRENCH IN DENIAL**

Paris, March 21.—A report that Premier Poincare has received a communication from Premier Ramsay MacDonald of England in reference to the security of France's frontiers was denied by the foreign office this afternoon.

**PURDY IN SANITARIUM**

Marion, Ind., March 21.—Leonard Purdy, 110th engineer, was admitted to the national sanitarium March 13. Sanitarium officials say their observation and diagnosis has not been completed, but that Purdy is in no immediate danger.

**ARREST SOVIET 'ANARCHISTS'**

Moscow, March 21.—A number of anarchists and social revolutionaries who have been conducting armed raids against Soviet institutions, were arrested today by the Tcheka—Soviet secret police.
