WORLD COURT PLAN ADVOCATED BY TWO VISITING SPEAKERS

World peace, through the entry of America into the world court plan of the late President Harding, was urged by Hamilton Holt, former editor of the Independent, and Dr. Nehemiah Boynton, Brooklyn pastor and former moderator of the Congressional church of America...

Dr. Boynton denounced the spirit of isolation, saying: "Isolation is not the principle on which the great God founded the universe; not isolation but intimacy, there is an increasing intimacy and fellowship in world affairs."

"The three great applications of internationalism today," he said, "are the world court, the League of Nations and the new alliance for the spread of internationalism through the churches."

Holt, who has spent much of his time since the organization of the league in Geneva at the councils of the league, told of the importance of America joining that body and working toward the political organization of the world from which justice and peace may be expected to follow.

URGES LUNDENDORFF BE GIVEN 2 YEARS

Berlin, March 21.—Counsel in the Luderhoff-Hitler high treason trial today urged the court to impose a two year term of imprisonment on General Erich Luderhoff, directing genius of the German armies in the great war.

A term of eight years penal servitude was suggested for Adolf Hitler, founder of the Bavarian Fascist and main ring leader of the nationalist revolt last November.

Other recommendations by the public prosecutor were six years fortress imprisonment for the defendants Poehner, Kriebel and Weber; two years for Boehm; one year and six months for Wagner and one year and three months for Permet.

Mrs. Schick Nearly Collapses Following Grilling Of 3 Days

San Diego, Cal., March 21.—On the verge of collapse after three days on the witness stand, Mrs. Sarah Margaret Schick, star witness for the state, was supported on the arms of a bailiff as she left the courtroom at the noon recess today.

For two days she has been mercilessly grilled by attorneys for Clark, accused of the murder of her husband, George E. Schick, prominent realty broker of this city.

Heavy Lumber Orders Expected From Japan

Portland, Ore., March 21.—Expectation that reconstruction and active buying in volume is to be expected from the stricken earthquake area in Japan and especially at Yokohama, was expressed by M. P. Smith of D. L. Blodgett & Co., importers and exporters, who recently returned from a five months' tour of the Orient.

"Any building that is now done at Yokohama is temporary," Smith said. "Sheet iron and wooden structures are hastily thrown up to facilitate the permanent reconstruction that is to follow."

At present Yokohama is badly congested with imported products, but the Japanese are gradually finding their way out of the mess.

"There are huge quantities of lumber on hand and more pouring in. The financial situation is gradually straightening out and it appears that by mid-summer the Japanese will be prepared to buy. There is talk of improvements at Tokio that would make that city the importing center for Japan in place of Yokohama, but it is also said that such a step will not be undertaken and that Yokohama will hold a more important place than ever before."

"China is assailed with political difficulties and buyers there hesitate to go ahead because the future is so uncertain. There is considerable handiwork in North China. On a trip from Tientsin to Shanghai, each railroad car carried four guards, each train was equipped with a machine gun, and troops and a pilot engine went before each train to look out for damage to the tracks."

"Conditions in Manila are fair, but the financial situation could be better."

Half Million Awaits Mr. Firpo In Real U. S. Money New York, March 21.—Without being forced to the necessity of raising his hand in anger, least of all engaging in another furious frolic with Jack Dempsey, the sum of a half million easy American dollars awaits Luis Firpo in the United States, according to conservative advisers. These are advanced by Billy McCann, who is Firpo's director of exhibition tours.

Place Railroad Lands In Forest Reserves

Washington, March 21.—The ultimate destination of the Oregon and California grant lands, as well as those of the Coos bay wagon road grant, looking to their inclusion in the national forests, insofar as they are classified as chiefly valuable for forest purposes, is provided in two bills supported by the forest service, and introduced by Senator McNary.

The most of the lands, nearly 2,000,000 acres in all, affected by these bills, are in Coos, Curry, Douglas and Jackson counties. Senator McNary says that the bills may require some amendment, but follow the lines of disposition discussed between Colonel W. E. Greeley, chief of the forest service, and himself, as a basis for action, and he expects publication of the terms will bring forth suggestions from those interested. Colonel Greeley in a letter presenting the plans in view, says:

"One bill gives national forest status to approximately 472,000 acres of the O. and C. and Coos bay lands now within the forest boundaries. The other, through proclamation by the president, would give a national forest status to all O. and C. and Coos bay lands found by the secretary of agriculture and interior to be of such character and so located as to be chiefly valuable for national forest purposes. It is my understanding that the acreage which would be affected by the latter bill might aggregate 1,500,000 acres."

While the lands involved would be given a national forest status by the enactment of the measures and while the cutting and removal of timber would thereafter be under the direction of the secretary of agriculture, all receipts from the sale of the present crop of timber would be paid into the respective funds for distribution under the provisions of the act creating such funds. The only immediate settlement which would be required would be that in relation to the value of the land exclusively.

"Under the act of June 9, 1910 the only contribution to the O. and C. fund derived from the land itself is in the case of class 3 lands, for which a payment of \$2.50 per acre must be made by certain classes of entrymen. The act provides that after lands of class 2, which comprise the bulk of the grant, have been cut over, they become subject to entry under class 3, but that no provision will be required. No provision is made for payments to the fund from lands possessing water power value. The rules governing the classification and disposal of lands as set forth by the act of 1910 are also applicable to the Coos bay lands."
