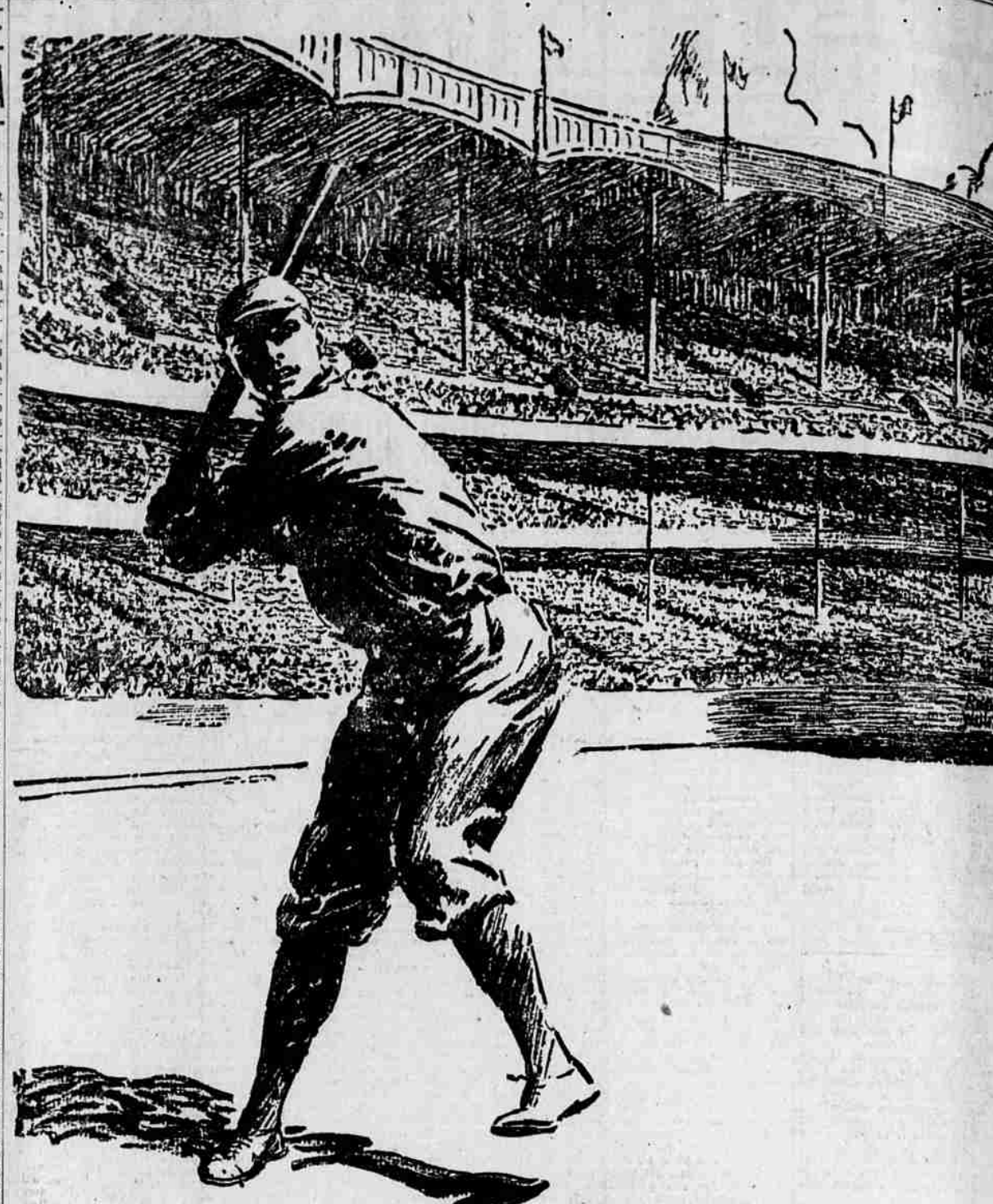
West is reported dying at the Vallejo emergency hospital and Moore, doctors said, has but slight chance of living.

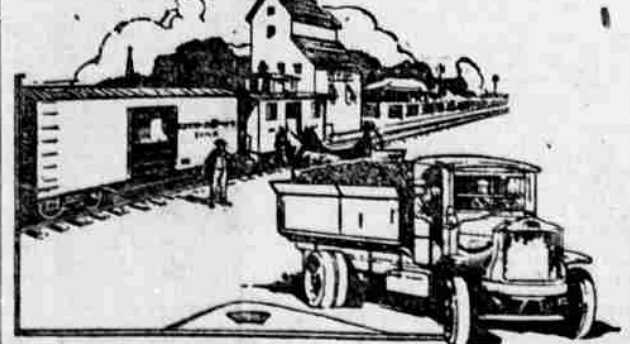

Concrete Roads Feed the Railroads

THE most expensive item of farming is the muddy road from the farm to the station. Where concrete roads are built, farmers can catch the way freight and get their stuff to market often the same day. Therefore, around every freight yard, a well-built reinforced concrete roadway should be provided, especially where trunk lines cross. Then while much of the farm shipping is "muddled in," the farmers along the concrete may ship daily and one of the most profitable co-operations is to unite in a truck service which will pick up all the milk cans and other produce and meet the daily local freight.

The concrete road itself should be watched very carefully by every taxpayer to see that it is durably built with steel mesh reinforcement and is not abused by overloaded trucks or heavy machinery with lugs on the wheels. Watch it.

Cottage Grove-Lorane Highway, partially rolled. 12 ft. (NOT 16 ft.) built under Sharp-Roney, 1923. Cost per mile \$6,727.20.
