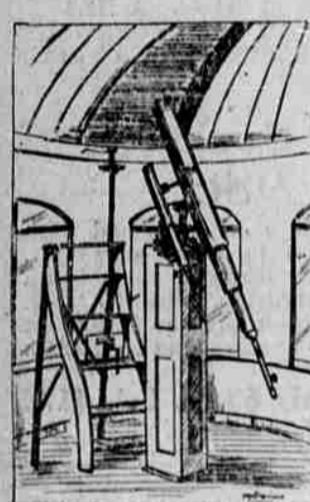

## Two Astronomical Telescopes



Have recently been mounted in the Astronomical Observatory.

## CLUB PRESIDENTS STEAM SHOVELS ON RULE DAY'S MEET. OREGON FEDERATION

Oregon City, Ore., May 21.—(I. N. S.)—The "process" of presidents was the feature today of the session of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs.  
Presidents of 85 women's clubs over the state, summed up the outstanding accomplishments of their organizations in terse, one sentence expressions. They dealt with establishment of new club houses, playsheds for children, Christmas seal sales, contributions to scholarship loan funds and similar activities.  
One hundred and thirty-seven of the 165 clubs of the federation are using the Americanization questionnaire, according to a report made by Miss Catherine Bradshaw of Portland. She pointed out that 1,157 foreign born students are enrolled in colleges in English which are taught by club women.  
Miss Bradshaw in her general talk on "Americanization" urged the native born to set an example for the foreign born, submitting that such spectacles as Teapot Dome and the Multnomah county bridge scandals are not wholesome lessons for prospective citizens.  
Klamath Falls, May 21.—Fifty-ton steam shovels which have been moved overland 40 miles from Kirk to Odell lake on the new Klamath Falls-Eugene line, have prepared the east portal of the tunnel at the summit of the Cascades and operations on the 3995-foot bore will begin at once.  
The Odell tunnel will be one of the engineering marvels of this state, according to engineers, and aside from its unusual length, it will be bored on a five-degree curve. The tunnel will penetrate the barrier between eastern and western Oregon a 5,000-foot elevation will be the first and longest of a series of 15 tunnels between Odell and Oakridge.  
Work is progressing on clearing a 200-foot right-of-way on the west side of the summit and grading camps are established every few miles between mile post 31, the present rail head, and Odell. The Potts sawmill, recently established at Odell, cut timbers for the tunnels, has started operations.

## Alleged Drunken Motorist Kills One

Portland, Ore., May 21.—One man was fatally injured and a second slightly, Tuesday afternoon, when they were struck while at work at the intersection of Union avenue and Broadway by a wildly speeding car piloted by a driver reported to have been drunk, which bore down on them without warning.  
Peter Green, 59, died at St. Vincent's hospital. He suffered a crushed chest and head injuries.  
Walter Batach was first taken to the hospital but later went to his home for some minor injuries were dressed.  
Paul W. Hartman, driver of the car, was arrested by Motorcycle Patrolman Reed on a charge of driving while drunk. A day or two on charge will be changed to manslaughter, according to Deputy District Attorney Kirk, who fixed bail at \$2,500.

## President Submits To Gas Treatment For Second Time

Washington, May 21.—President Coolidge submitted to another chlorine gas treatment this afternoon for his cold. He was in a gas-filled room for 50 minutes and was said to be greatly relieved.  
President Coolidge was gassed on Tuesday. He took the chlorine gas treatment for colds, invented by the chemical warfare service of the army. The president's cold was broken Tuesday but traces of it hung on. He spent several hours at his office, presiding at the cabinet meeting and receiving newspaper correspondents.

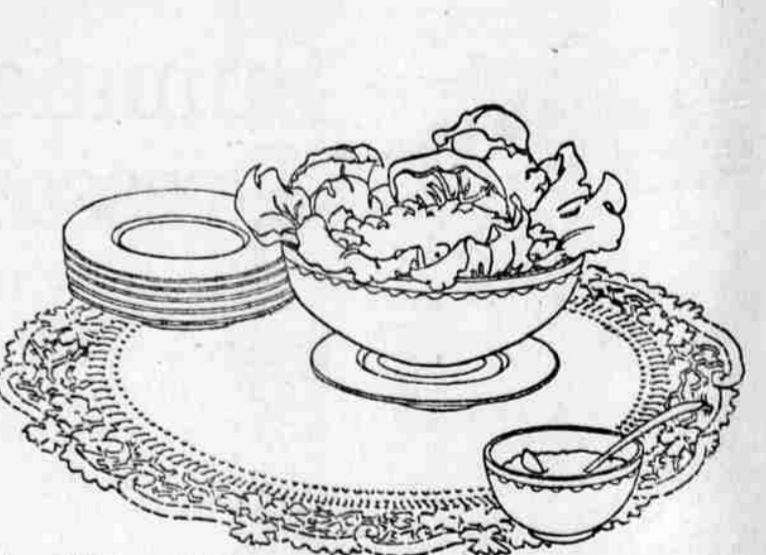
