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EARLY START ON IMPROVEMENT UP M'KENZIE ASKED

Immediate action in the matter of building that portion of the McKenzie highway lying just below the Cook place, where it has never been graded, is asked of the county court in a petition from residents of road district No. 2. The people of that district raised \$400 by a five-mill special tax for this purpose, and maintain that it was not for the purpose of cooperating with the state but that it should be used by Superior Road. The county court, which will visit the scene of the proposed improvements Friday and talk with those interested, is of the opinion that the \$400 should be expended now, as the state has promised to equal a sum raised by district and county. With the \$400 of county money matched with the district fund, and a matching by the state of the total, about \$17,000 will be available instead of \$400, point out members of the court. This is really worth while, they contend, as the state will take over maintenance of the road after it is built according to state specifications, and not until this is done. With state help a total of two miles of road can be fixed, and maintenance provided for; with the \$400 but a half mile could be improved.

COOLIDGE TO TRY TO WIN THE WEST

WASHINGTON, July 17.—"Coppering" the announced campaign plans of Senator Robert M. La Follette, independent candidate for the presidency, to invade the industrial east, President Coolidge conferred Wednesday with members of his "strategy board" to map a campaign to win the agricultural west.

Despite the absence of congress from Washington, the president is

laying plans to further aid the stricken agrarians of the western states.

For the most part, additional aid will be rendered the farmers through manipulation of the flexible tariff scale, and through the war finance corporation.

First indication of the farm aid program was given when the tariff commission this week opened an investigation into the tariff on butter.

It was explained that President Coolidge feels in view of his advocacy of diversified farming and the subsequent entry of many western farmers into dairy operations than an increase in duty on butter might well be considered.

Foremost in today's council at the White House was William M. Butler, chairman of the republican national committee and personal director of the president's campaign. Butler has just returned from the west. He brought to the president many suggestions for combatting the combined attack of the democratic and independent forces west of the Mississippi.

Another westerner to confer with the president was Senator Bursum, republican of New Mexico. Bursum urged Mr. Coolidge to take a definite stand in his speech in acceptance of the nomination, in reclamation, water power and flood control in the southwest.

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ALLIED CONFERENCE WORKS ON KNOTTY GERMAN PROBLEMS

LONDON, July 17.—Full sessions of the allied conference on the Dawes reparations plan were abandoned today while three committees of the delegates from the ten nations grappled with knotty problems.

The American delegates, Ambassador Frank Kellogg and Colonel James A. Logan Jr., unofficial American observers on the reparations commission, had the busy task of serving on all three committees.

While serious difficulties are ahead of the conference, the way seemed

cleared today to an eventual agreement by the general feeling that the United States will permit an American to serve in the unofficial capacity of "negotiations agents," with powers to treat all disputes arising between Germany and the allied countries.

Of the three committees, the most difficult task faces that bordered the duty of defining German reparations under the Dawes plan — to be what body will judge when there has been a default—and to lay measures to meet a default.

The second committee is working measures for restoring German economic and fiscal unity and third methods of transferring payments from Germany to the nations.
